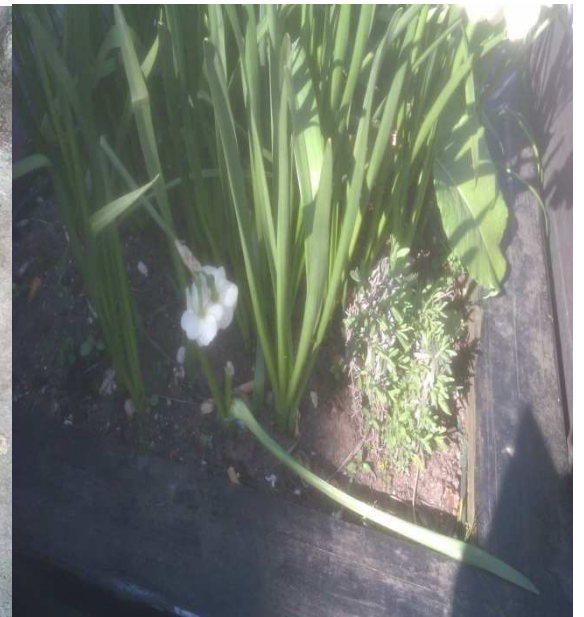

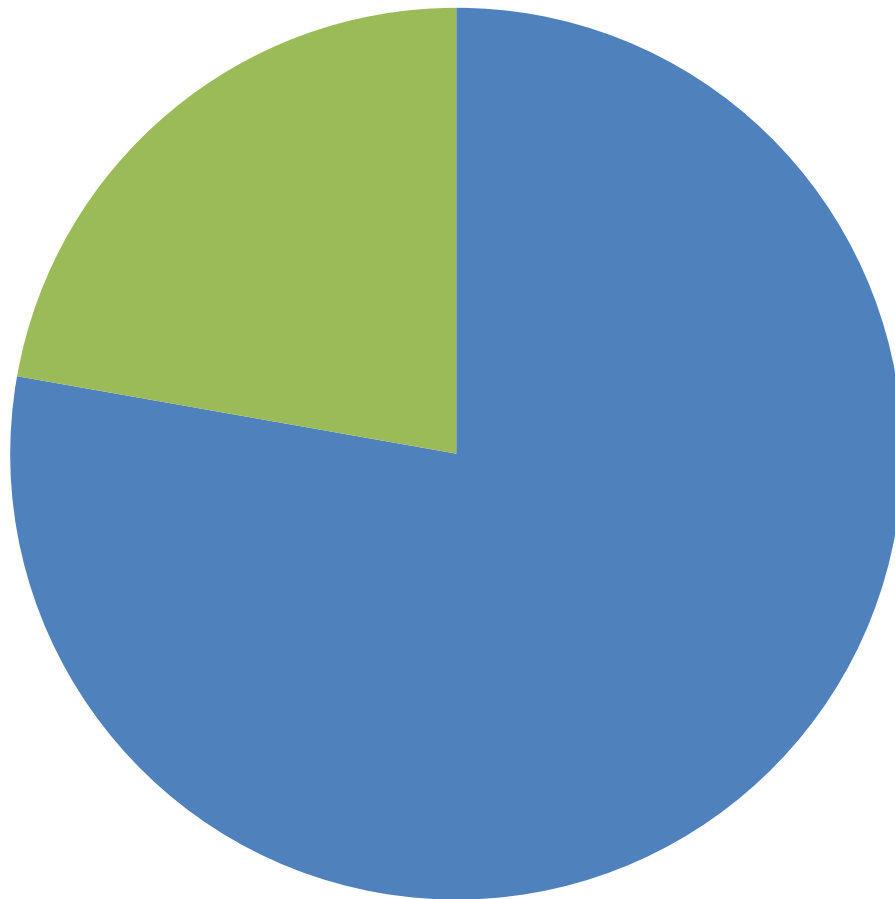

Do you think there should be a betting shop?



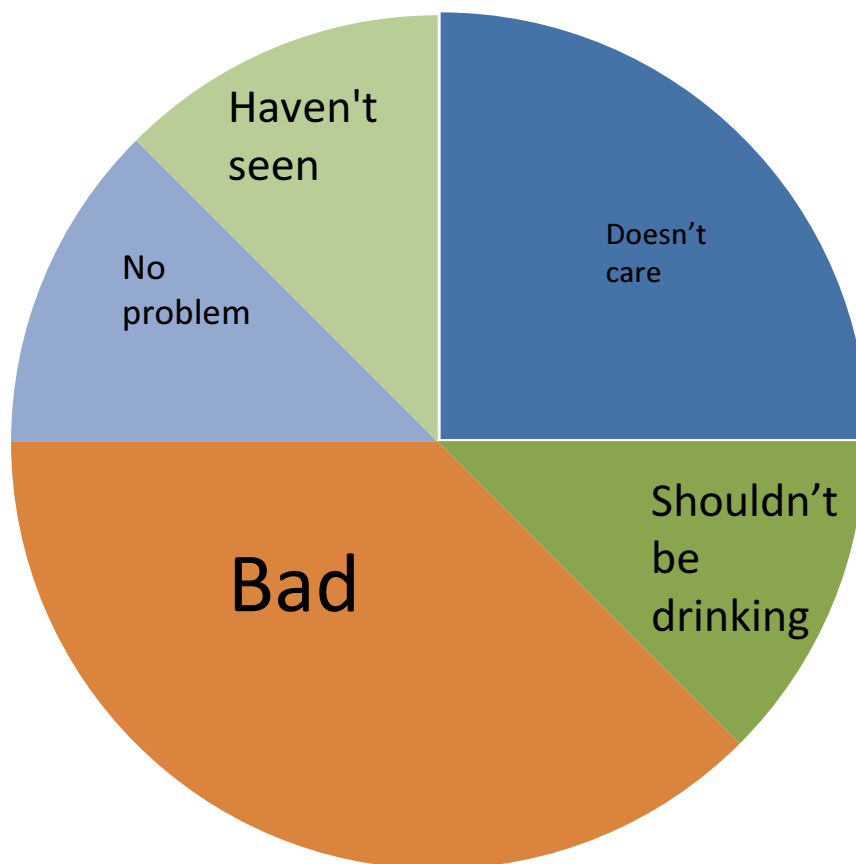

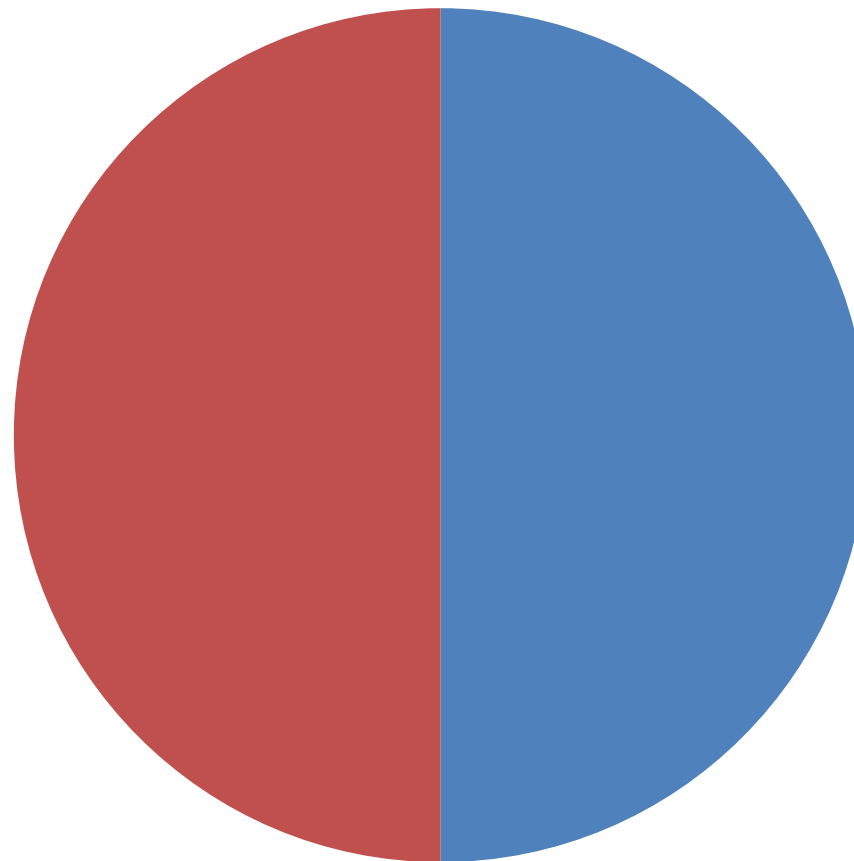
As you can see, most residents do not want a betting shop

Solutions for the betting shop

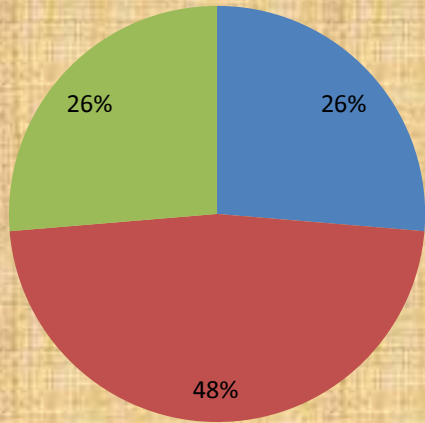
- Solution 2

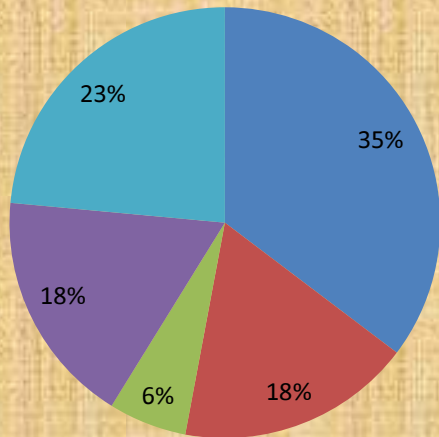
Limited Shops





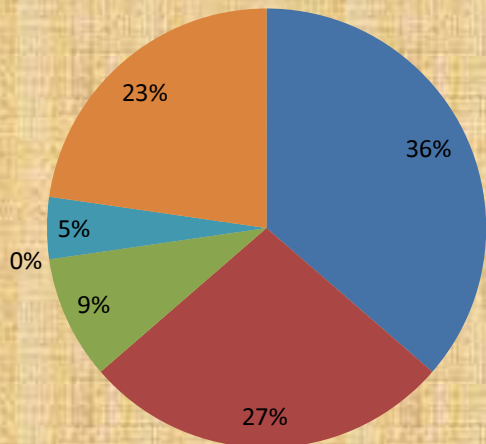

This Sangley sandwich bar has been closed down. Meaning locals want this to turn into a shop like Tesco Express or other things like this .



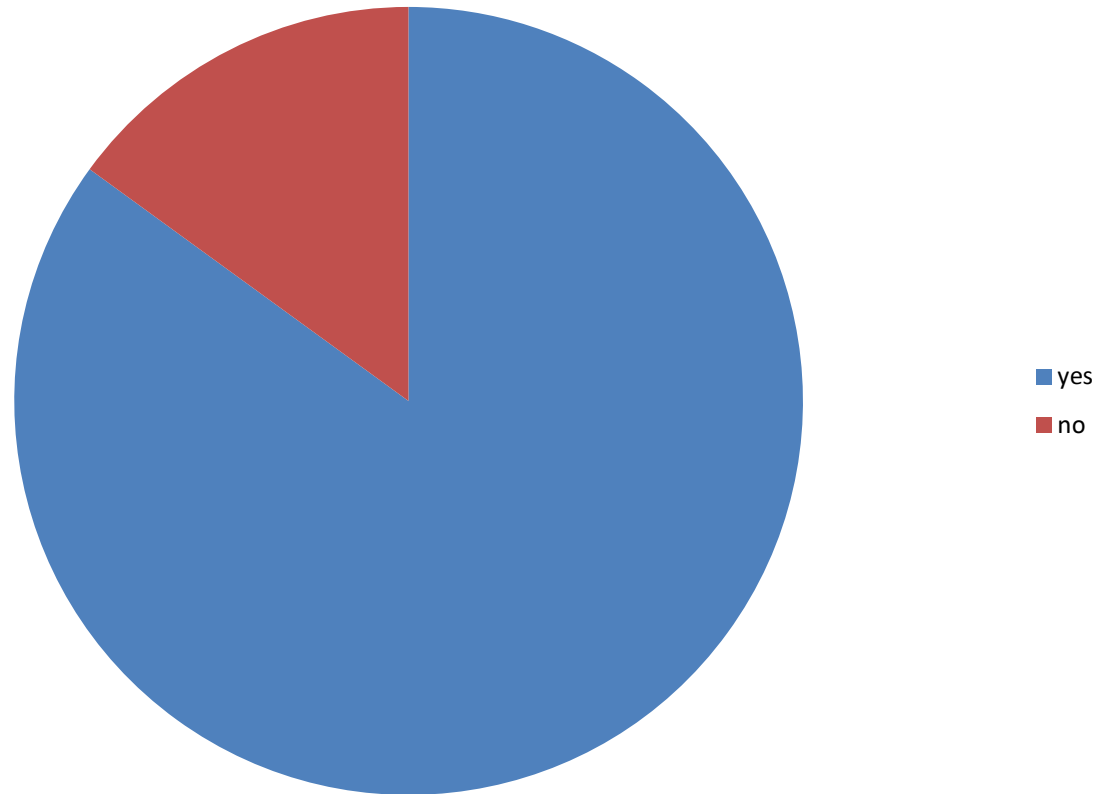
If shops don't fit the criteria then they should lend the shop to another category which people would want

Another solution is ask more shops to stock more items of different varieties

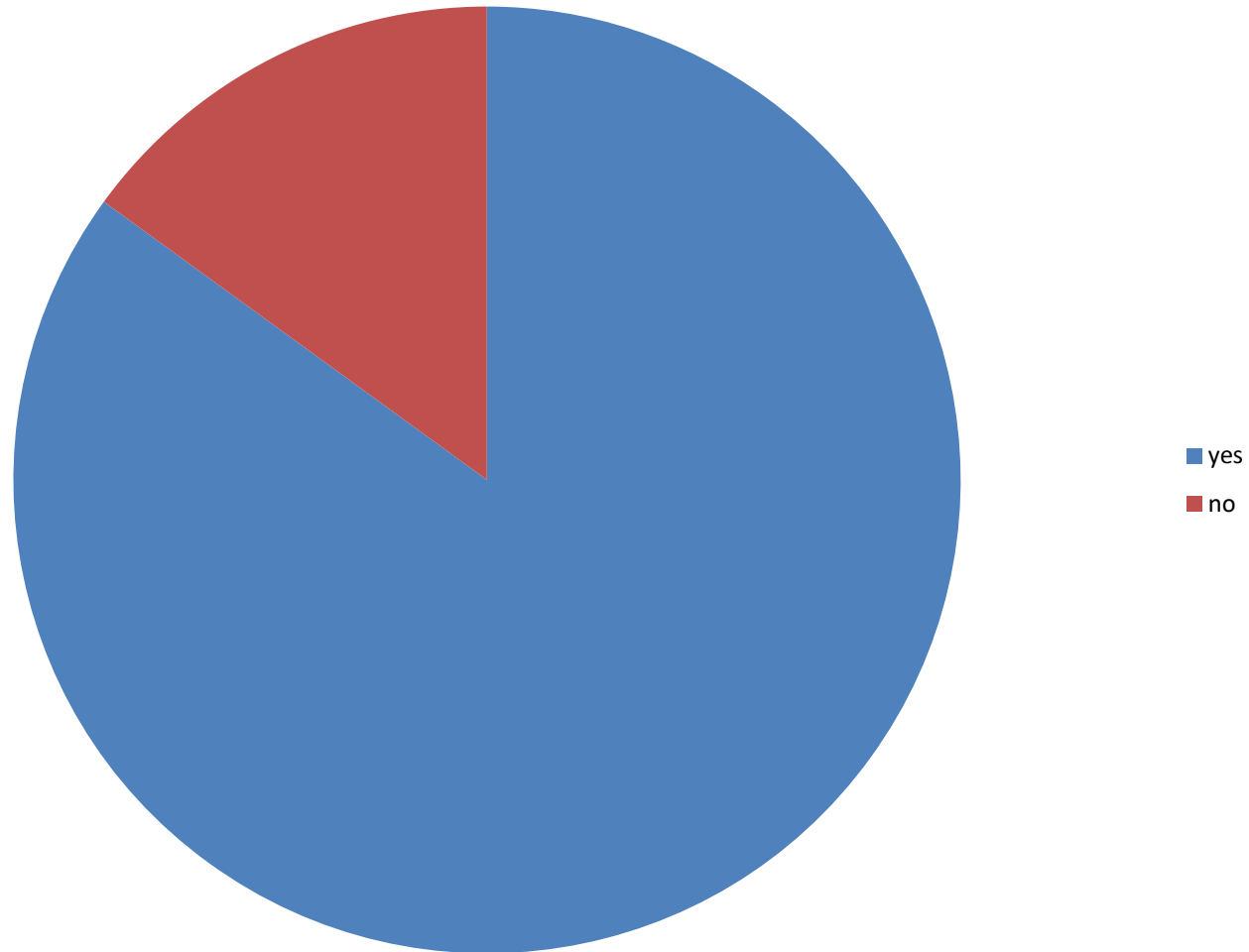

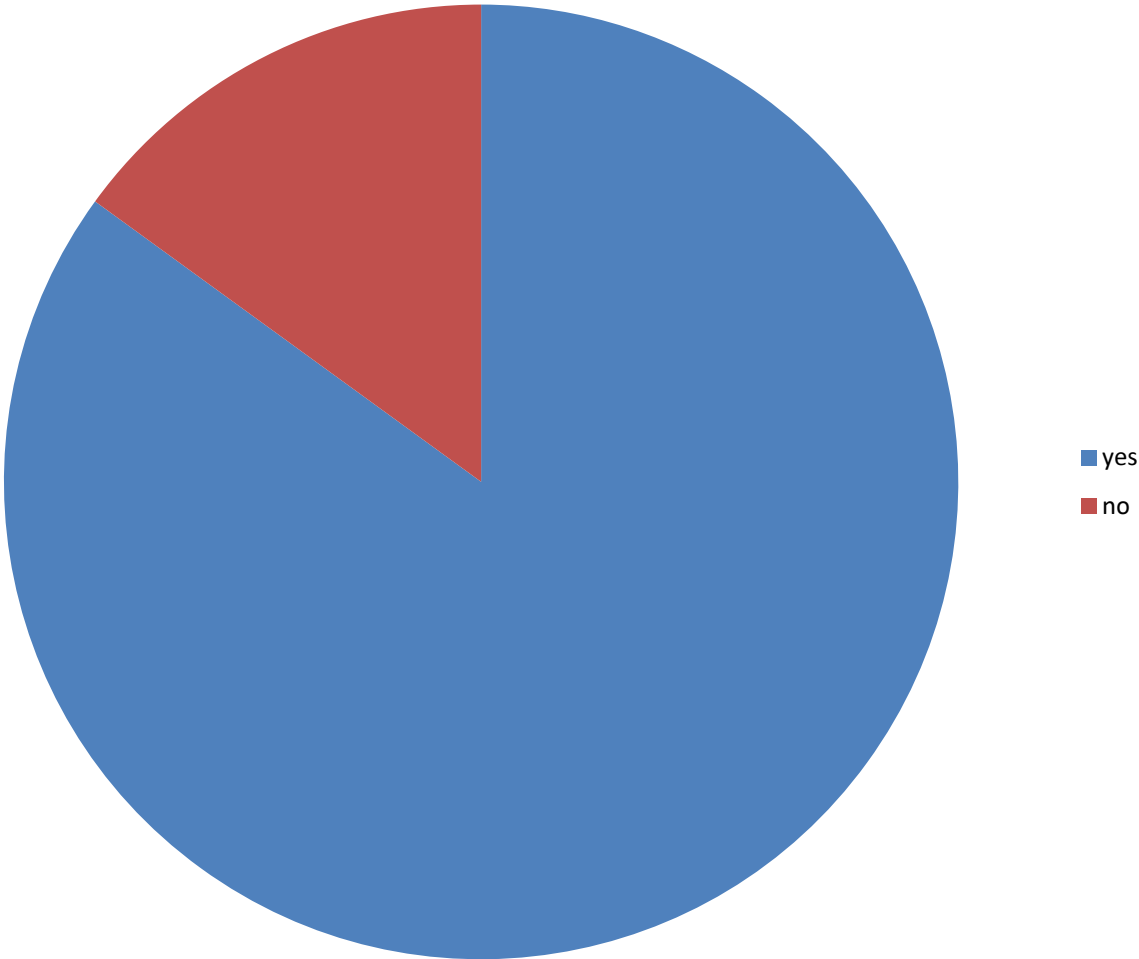
Have You Ever Had An Accident On These Pavements?



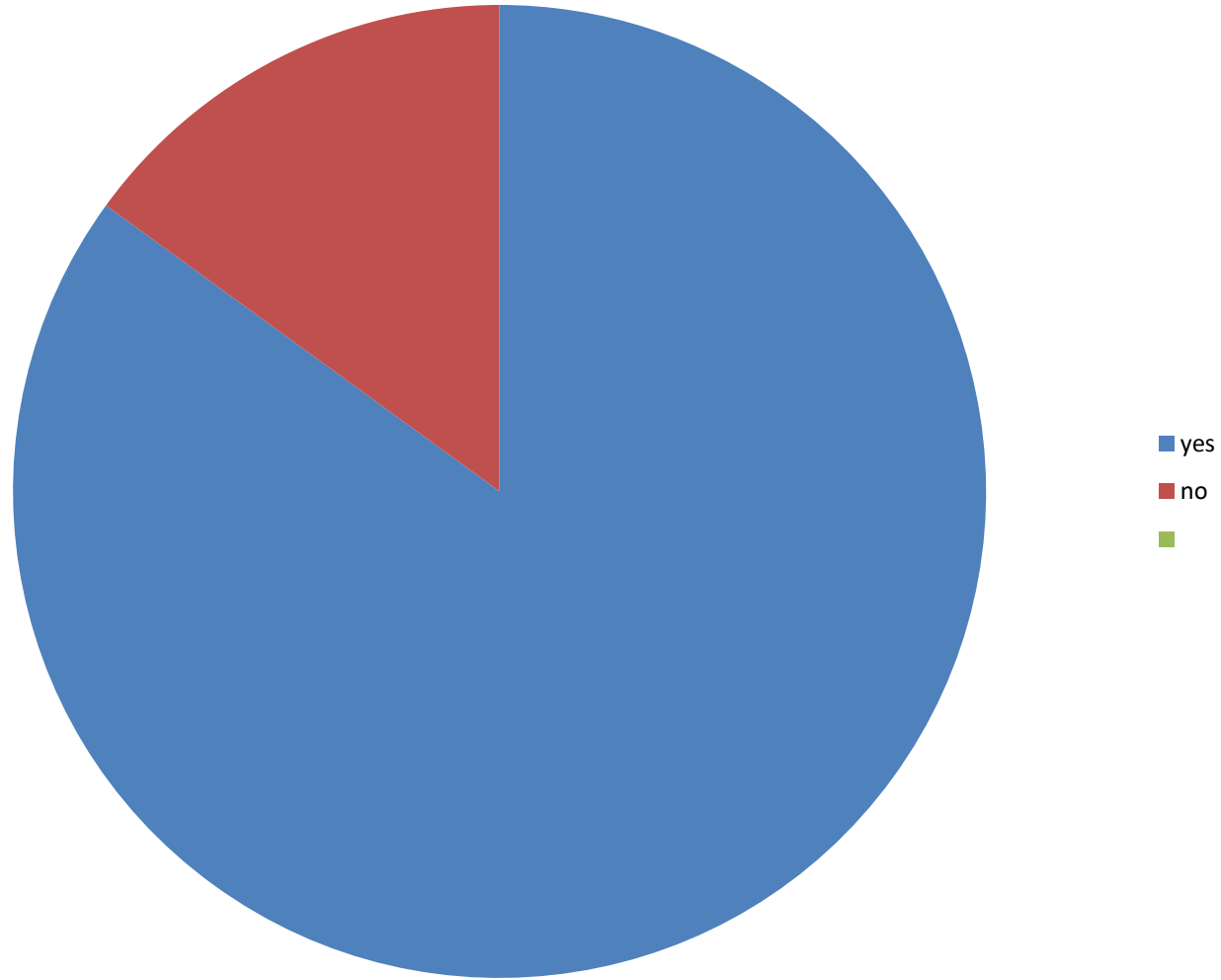
Do You Think The Pavements Can Be Improved?



Do You Think The Council Could Do A Better Job?

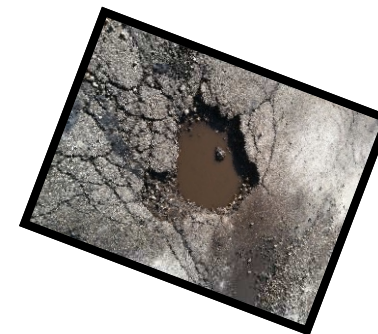


Do You Think The Pavements Are In Good Condition?





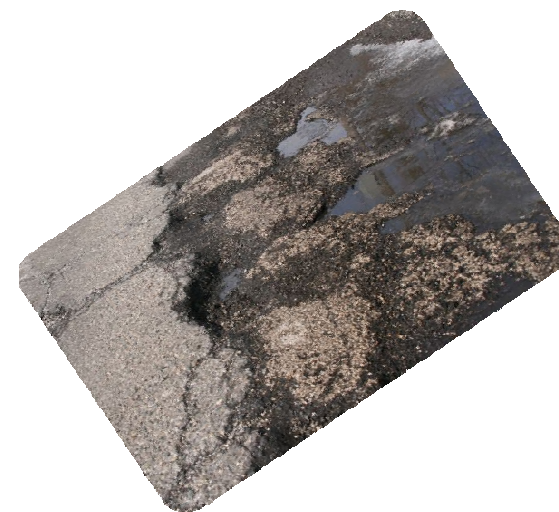
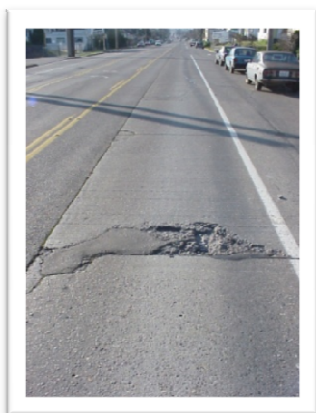
Solutions

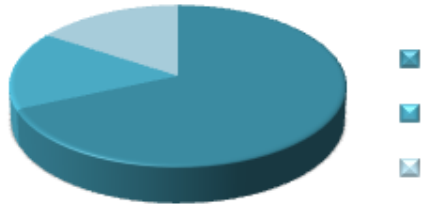

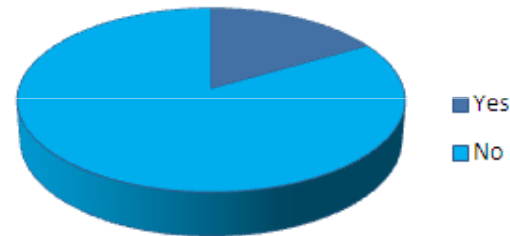

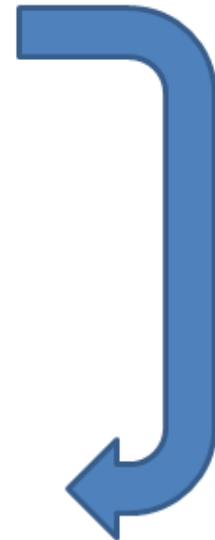
Do you think there is an issue with fly tipping?

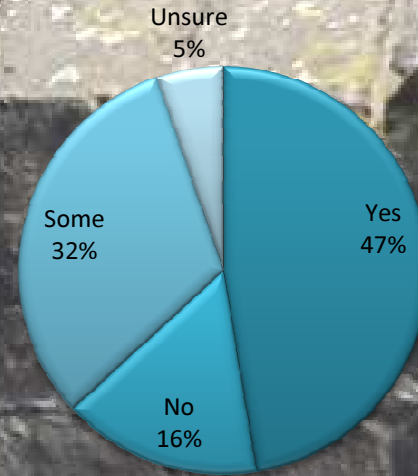

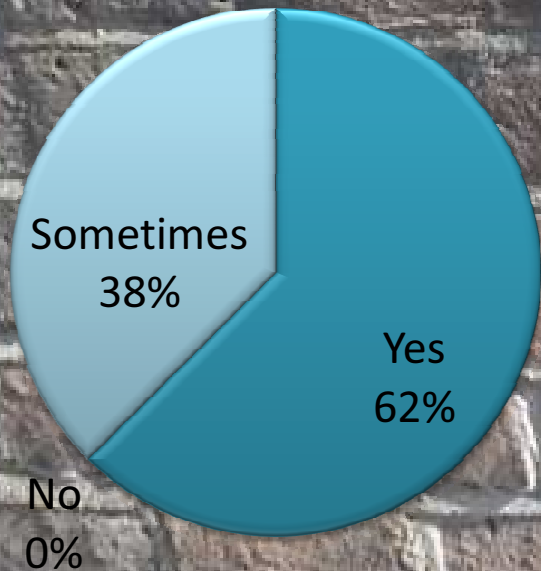

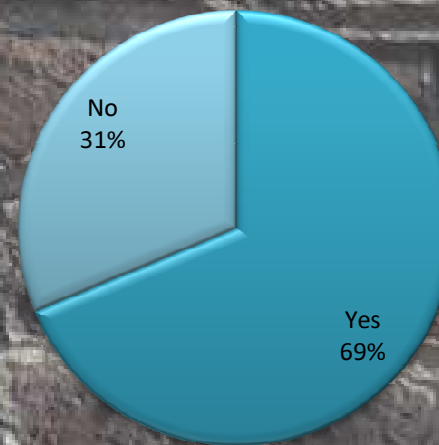
Do you think the people living in this area are friendly?

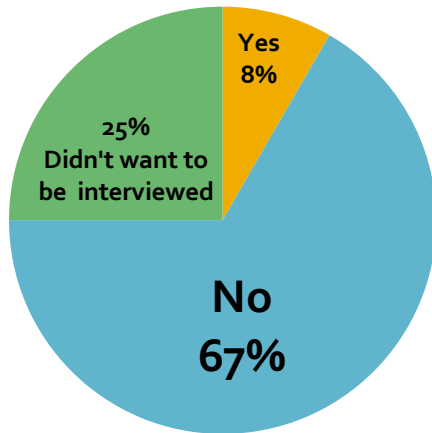

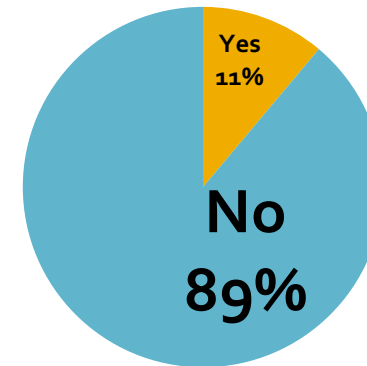
This car was previously seen with somebody leaning over the car door looking suspicious. This could be a case of drug dealing in an alleyway.

How does drug dealing affect locals?

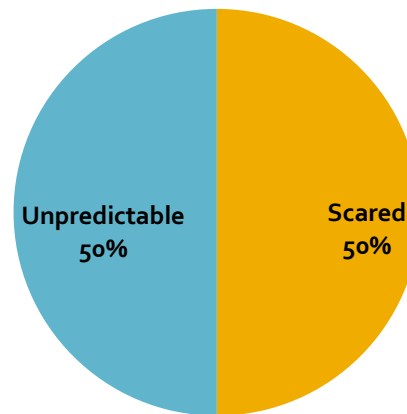
Do you agree that there is drug dealing in the area?

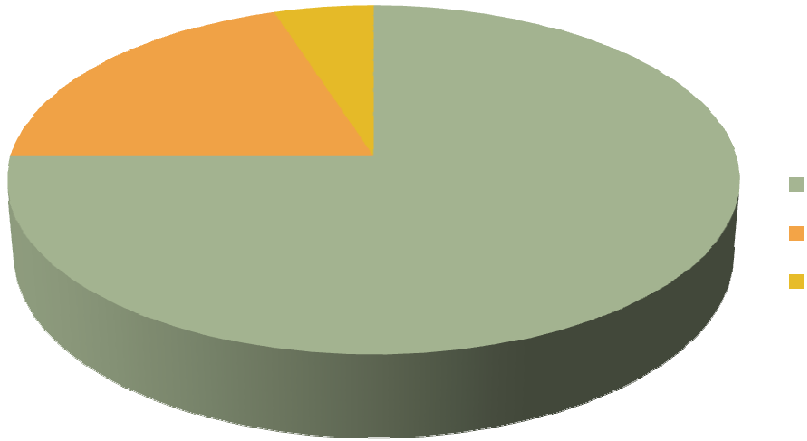
Our solutions to Drug Dealing

- Raise awareness of drug to local people (e.g. putting leaflets in doors)

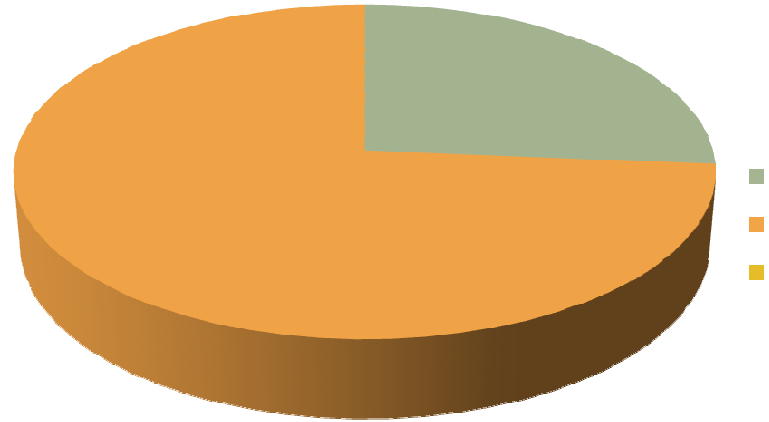

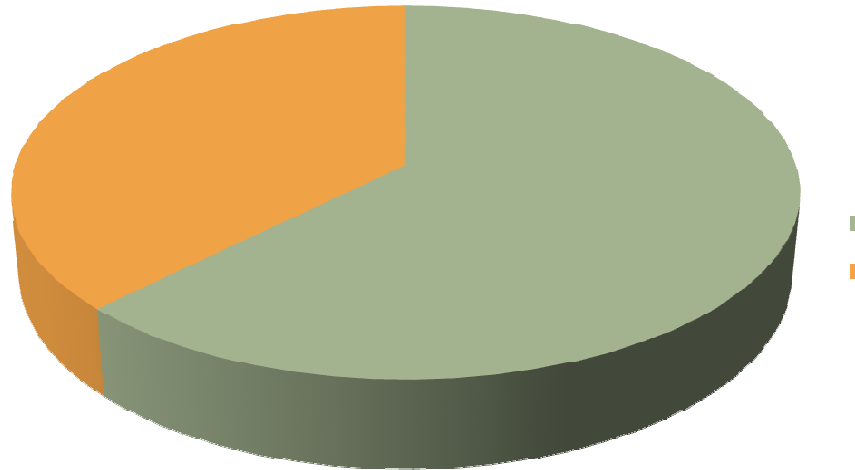

- 4. Make bins look more appealing to residents so they will put more care towards them.**

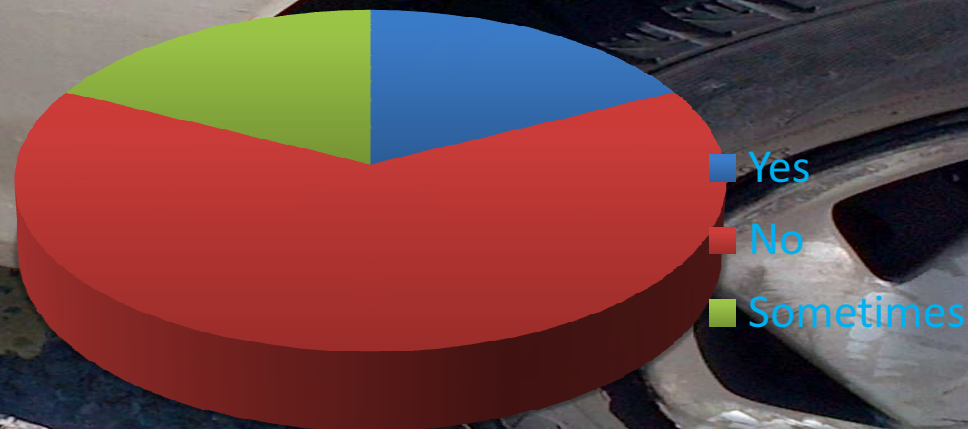

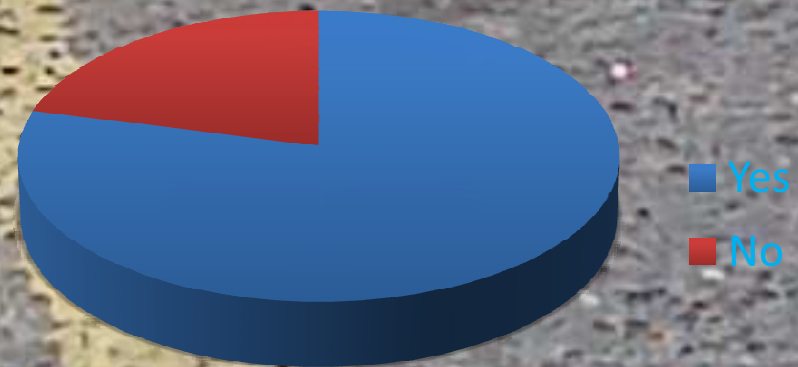
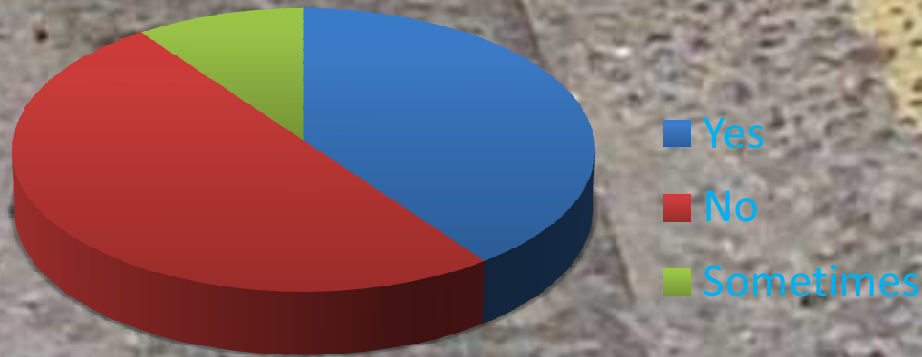

Ⓟ Add more parking signs informing drivers of penalties or fines if they don't follow them.

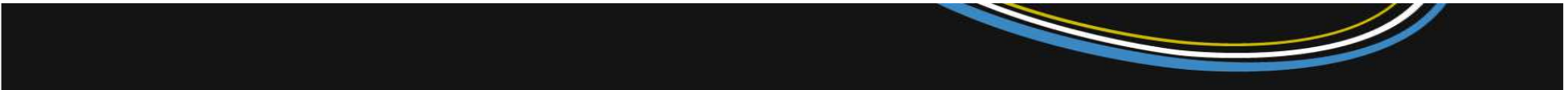
Ⓟ Yellow lines could be painted more brightly so they can be seen in the dark as well.

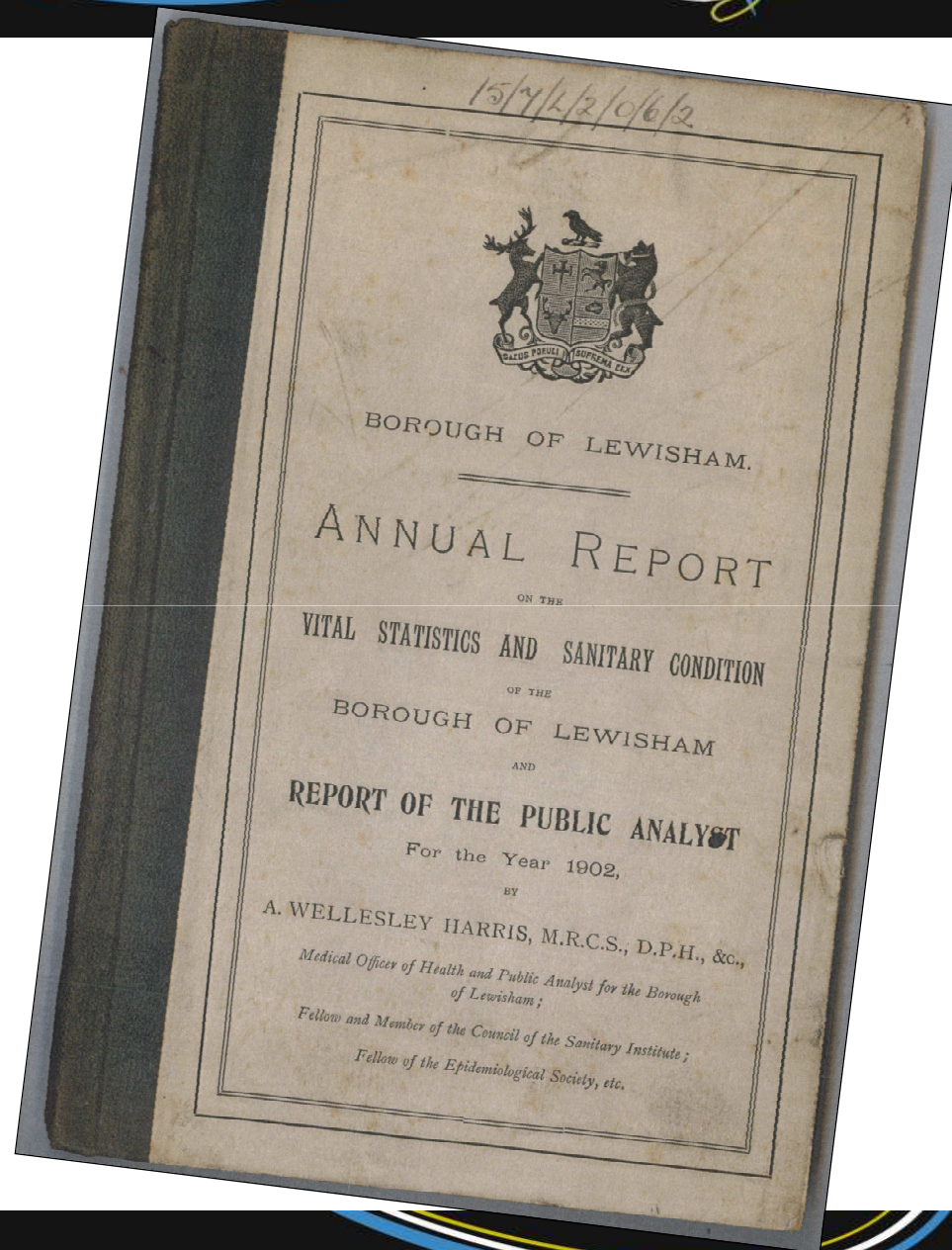


The profession of public health began in local authorities



Early 1900s

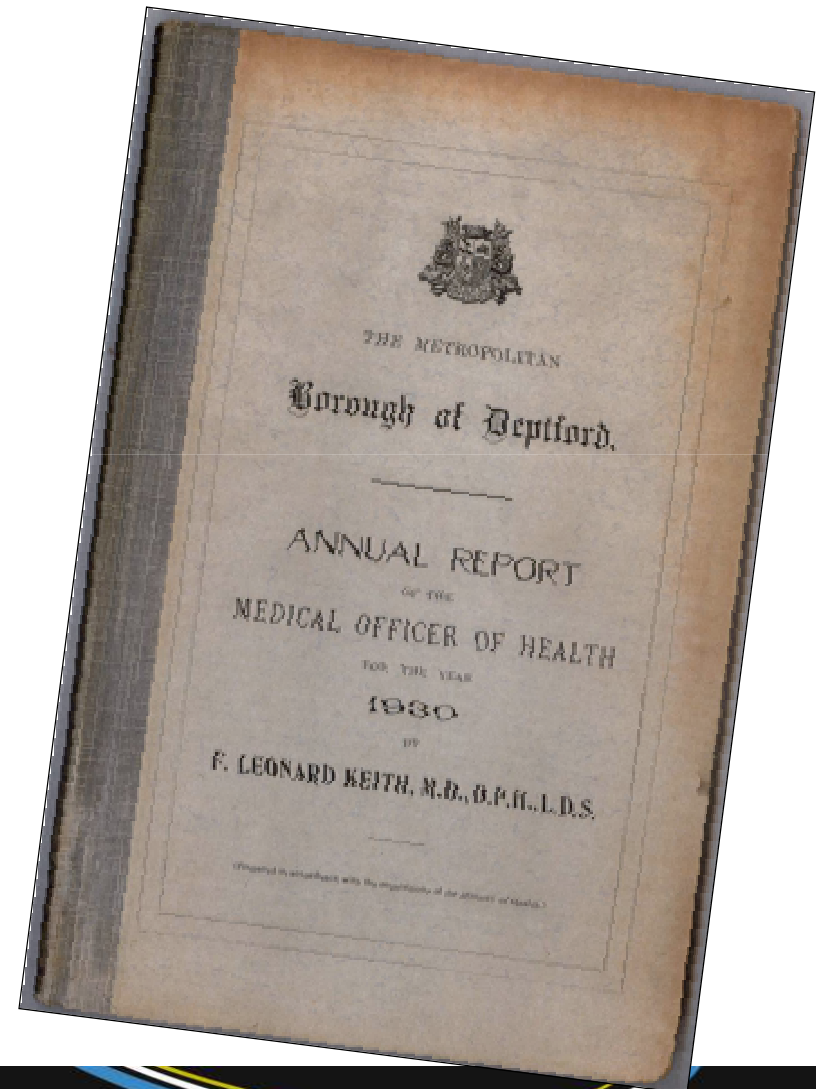
- **Infectious diseases major cause of death**

Emergence of Chronic Non-infectious Disease

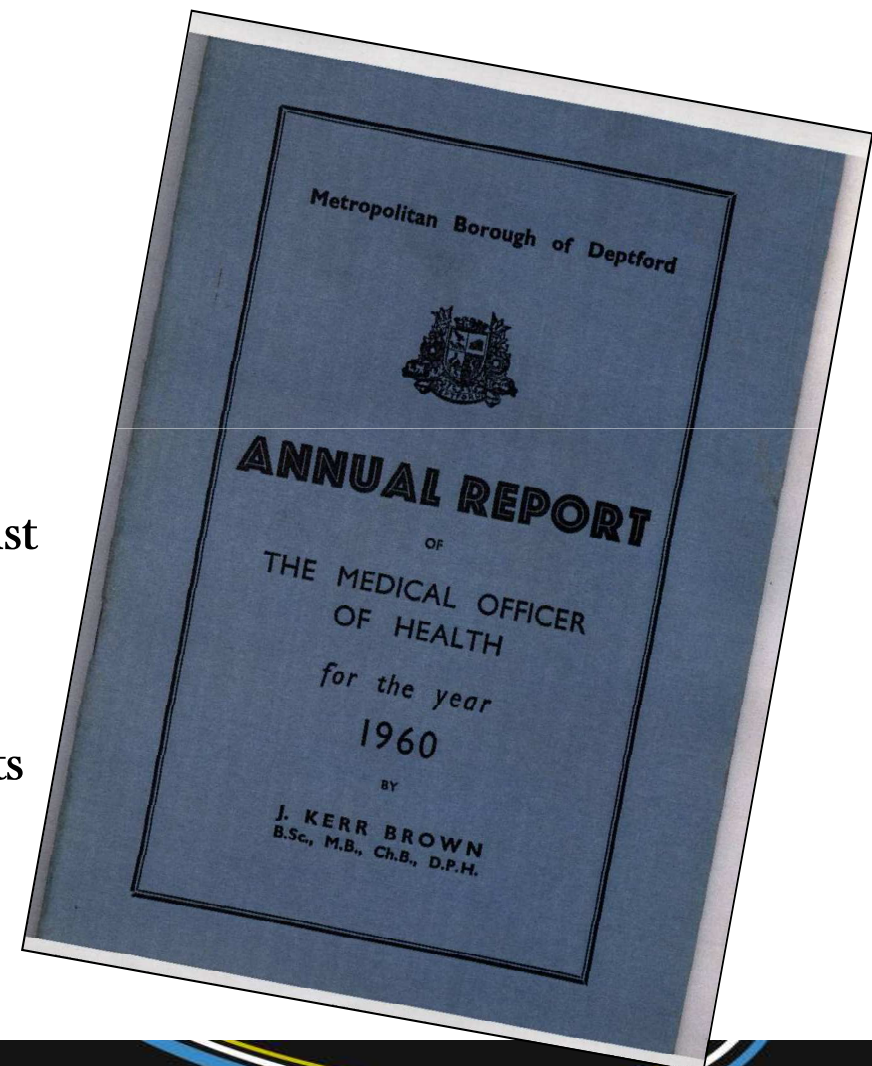

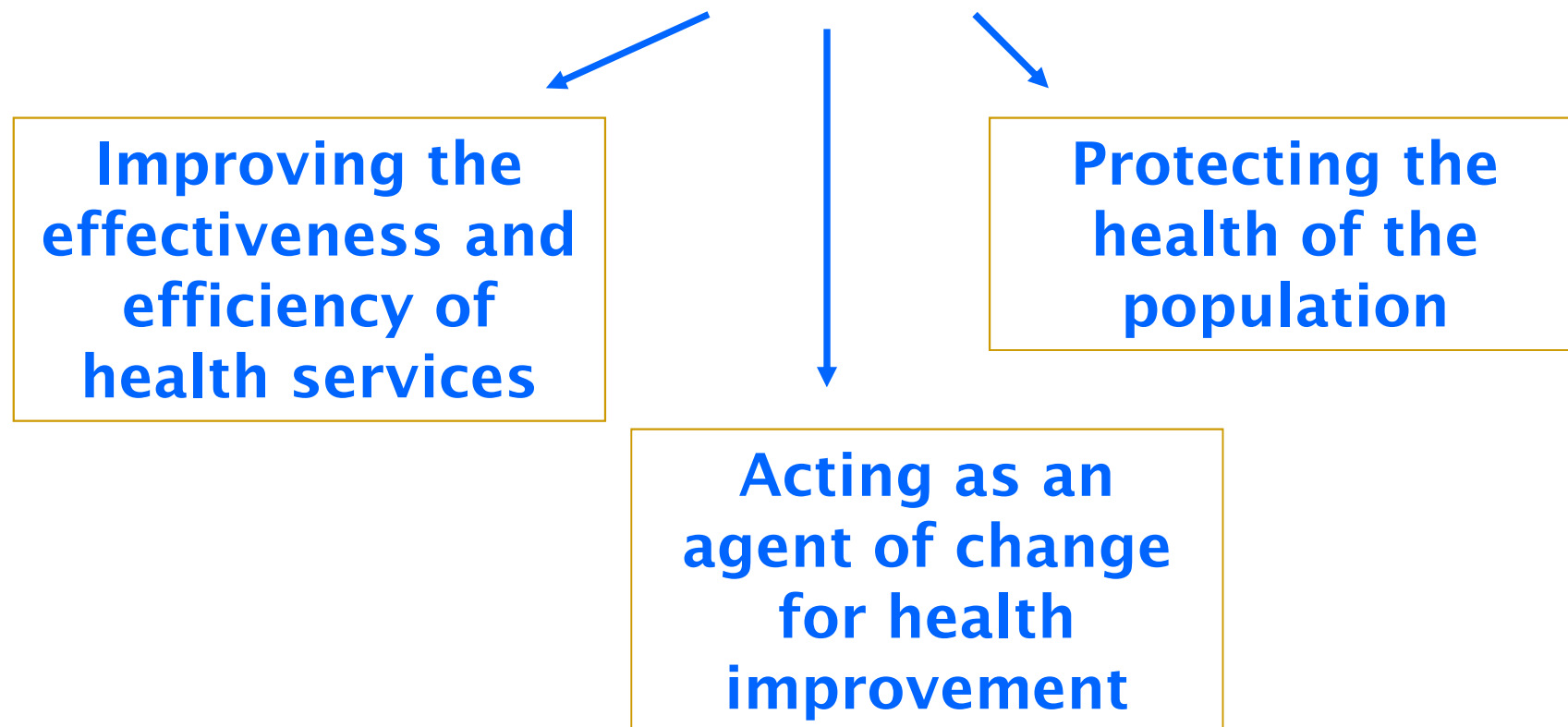

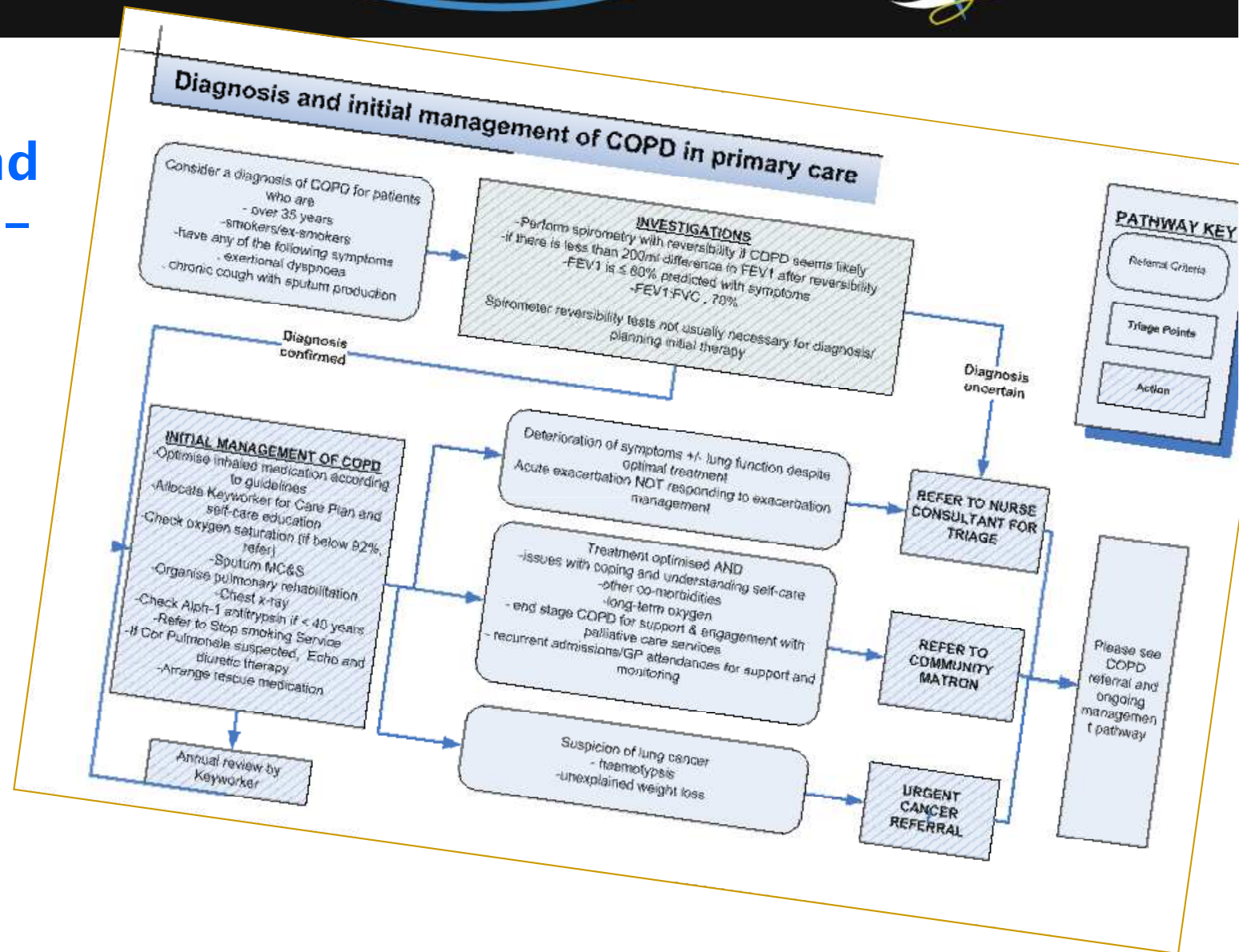

Vaccinating 95% will protect our children

Welcome to the first edition of *Lewisham Shield*, a new quarterly newsletter helping to keep you up-to-date with the Lewisham immunisation programme, as well as including news, best practice and a look at some of the data collected locally and nationally. In 2009-10, the Care Quality Commission's review of Immunisation targets revealed that Lewisham was the fifth-worst performing PCT in London, and London was one of the worst performing Health Authorities. So it has never been more important to keep driving forwards with our joint efforts to deliver greater coverage of childhood immunisations in the borough.

One of the key issues all trusts face is that we have the recommended ages for childhood immunisations, but also reporting ages - where the immunisation data is submitted to the Department of Health (COVER data, in some cases submitted up to a year after recommended age of immunisation) - plus another age cohort and standard at which general practices receive their performance payments for immunisation. At every opportunity Lewisham has fed back to the Department of Health that these discrepancies divide the different aspects of immunisation care and need to be united into one, single performance reporting standard. Until this is addressed at a national level, we want to take every opportunity to urge immunisers and local practice managers to immunise and chase up unimmunised children as early as possible. This will help reduce the risk of disease outbreak and protect the younger, more vulnerable members of our community.

Some countries have all but eradicated measles, but in the UK and Europe we are still reporting cases and seeing local outbreaks like the London measles epidemic in 2008. On Page 5 the Health Protection Agency presents

the numbers of recorded cases of confirmed and suspected measles and other preventable childhood diseases, can still result in fatalities despite the best medical care. By setting out clearly our vision for immunisations in Lewisham and taking you step-by-step through our programmes of work, we hope that you will recognise that immunisation is everyone's business and join us in our efforts to shield local children from preventable diseases.
