Strategic Context			

1. Purpose

NHS Lewisham CCG completed its statutory annual report and accounts for 2015-16 in May 2016. The document attached at Appendix A is the annual review summary that was launched at the CCG's annual general meeting and provides key information for our local population in an accessible format.

2. Recommendation

The Health and Wellbeing Board is asked to note the CCG's annual review summary for 2015-16.

3. Policy Context

The CCG annual reports and accounts were produced to meet the requirements of the National Health Service Act 2006 (as amended) on the basis of guidance and directions from NHS England. The CCG followed the requirements of the Department of Health Group Manual for Accounts 2015/16 and associated supporting information.

The annual report and review summary outline how the CCG is meeting its statutory obligations, and its work with local partners and with other CCGs in south east London.

4. Background

Appendix A contains the CCG's annual review for 2015-16 that covers key information from the annual report and accounts for 2015-16.

5. Summary of report

The annual review summary outlines the key areas of work for the CCG during 2015-16, health challenges, an overview of expenditure on services, performance against NHS Constitutional Standards, and public engagement and involvement.

6. Financial implications

The review contains a breakdown for 2015-16 of areas of expenditure on health services including acute, mental health, continuing care, community services, and primary care, and further detail on acute services.

7. Legal implications

Under Section 195 Health and Social Care Act 2012, health and wellbeing boards are under a duty to encourage integrated working between the persons who arrange for health and social care services in the area. This is recognised in the examples of partnership and integrated working that are contained in the document.

8. Crime and Disorder Implications

There are no specific crime and disorder implications arising from this report or its recommendations.

9. Equalities Implications

The review identifies some of those initiatives that have been undertaken to meet the CCG's responsibilities to reduce health inequalities and to improve health outcomes for the whole population. Examples of engagement with 'seldom heard' groups and with voluntary and community groups are also highlighted.
