A2	Oregano Leaf Application	<p>IN THE MATTER OF THE APPLICATION FOR A FULL VARIATION OF A PREMISES LICENCE THE COMMITTEE HAS CONSIDERED THE RELEVANT REPRESENTATIONS MADE.</p> <p>The Committee has made the following determination:</p> <p>With a view to ensuring the promotion of the licensing objectives, in accordance with the provisions of the statutory guidance and the principles of our licensing policy, the application for a full variation of a premises licence was REFUSED.</p> <p>In coming to a determination, the following factors were taken into account;</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Members of the Committee considered the representations made by the applicant. He states that he had made a mistake when trading beyond his licensable hours. He explained that he had bills to pay, overheads and staffing costs. The extended hours would allow him to earn enough money to pay for these bills. 2. Members of the Committee considered the representation made by Mr Power, Crime and Enforcement Officer. There was countless instances where the premises licensing hours were breached. There was evidence and data from online websites, namely Hungry House and Just Eat proving that the premises were trading beyond licensed hours. There was only one condition on their licence, the installation of a working CCTV. This condition had been breached, in that the CCTV was not working. 3. Members of the Committee considered the representation made by P.C. Gerry, that the premises were associated with immigration offences. 4. It was agreed that this decision would ensure that the licensing objectives, particularly the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance, were upheld.
