Members are asked to declare any personal interest they have in any item on the agenda.

## 1 Personal interests

There are three types of personal interest referred to in the Council's Member Code of Conduct :-

- (1) Disclosable pecuniary interests
- (2) Other registerable interests
- (3) Non-registerable interests

## 2 Disclosable pecuniary interests are defined by regulation as:-

- (a) <u>Employment,</u> trade, profession or vocation of a relevant person\* for profit or gain
- (b) <u>Sponsorship</u> –payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than by the Council) within the 12 months prior to giving notice for inclusion in the register in respect of expenses incurred by you in carrying out duties as a member or towards your election expenses (including payment or financial benefit from a Trade Union).
- (c) <u>Undischarged contracts</u> between a relevant person\* (or a firm in which they are a partner or a body corporate in which they are a director, or in the securities of which they have a beneficial interest) and the Council for goods, services or works.
- (d) <u>Beneficial interests in land</u> in the borough.
- (e) <u>Licence to occupy land</u> in the borough for one month or more.
- (f) <u>Corporate tenancies</u> any tenancy, where to the member's knowledge, the Council is landlord and the tenant is a firm in which the relevant person\* is a

partner, a body corporate in which they are a director, or in the securities of which they have a beneficial interest.

- (g) Beneficial interest in securities of a body where:-
  - (a) that body to the member's knowledge has a place of business or land in the borough; and
  - (b) either

(i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or 1/100 of the total issued share capital of that body; or

(ii) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the relevant person\* has a beneficial interest exceeds 1/100 of the total issued share capital of that class.

\*A relevant person is the member, their spouse or civil partner, or a person with whom they live as spouse or civil partner.

## (3) Other registerable interests

The Lewisham Member Code of Conduct requires members also to register the following interests:-

- (a) Membership or position of control or management in a body to which you were appointed or nominated by the Council
- (b) Any body exercising functions of a public nature or directed to charitable purposes, or whose principal purposes include the influence of public opinion or policy, including any political party
- (c) Any person from whom you have received a gift or hospitality with an estimated value of at least £25

## (4) Non registerable interests

Occasions may arise when a matter under consideration would or would be likely to affect the wellbeing of a member, their family, friend or close associate more than it would affect the wellbeing of those in the local area generally, but which is not required to be registered in the Register of Members' Interests (for example a matter concerning the closure of a school at which a Member's child attends).

## (5) Declaration and Impact of interest on members' participation

(a) Where a member has any registerable interest in a matter and they are present at a meeting at which that matter is to be discussed, they must declare the nature of the interest at the earliest opportunity and in any

event before the matter is considered. The declaration will be recorded in the minutes of the meeting. If the matter is a disclosable pecuniary interest the member must take not part in consideration of the matter and withdraw from the room before it is considered. They must not seek improperly to influence the decision in any way. <u>Failure to</u> <u>declare such an interest which has not already been entered in the</u> <u>Register of Members' Interests, or participation where such an</u> <u>interest exists, is liable to prosecution and on conviction carries a</u> <u>fine of up to £5000</u>

- (b) Where a member has a registerable interest which falls short of a disclosable pecuniary interest they must still declare the nature of the interest to the meeting at the earliest opportunity and in any event before the matter is considered, but they may stay in the room, participate in consideration of the matter and vote on it unless paragraph (c) below applies.
- (c) Where a member has a registerable interest which falls short of a disclosable pecuniary interest, the member must consider whether a reasonable member of the public in possession of the facts would think that their interest is so significant that it would be likely to impair the member's judgement of the public interest. If so, the member must withdraw and take no part in consideration of the matter nor seek to influence the outcome improperly.
- (d) If a non-registerable interest arises which affects the wellbeing of a member, their, family, friend or close associate more than it would affect those in the local area generally, then the provisions relating to the declarations of interest and withdrawal apply as if it were a registerable interest.
- (e) Decisions relating to declarations of interests are for the member's personal judgement, though in cases of doubt they may wish to seek the advice of the Monitoring Officer.

## (6) Sensitive information

There are special provisions relating to sensitive interests. These are interests the disclosure of which would be likely to expose the member to risk of violence or intimidation where the Monitoring Officer has agreed that such interest need not be registered. Members with such an interest are referred to the Code and advised to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer in advance.

## (7) Exempt categories

There are exemptions to these provisions allowing members to participate in decisions notwithstanding interests that would otherwise prevent them doing so. These include:-

- (a) Housing holding a tenancy or lease with the Council unless the matter relates to your particular tenancy or lease; (subject to arrears exception)
- (b) School meals, school transport and travelling expenses; if you are a parent or guardian of a child in full time education, or a school governor unless the matter relates particularly to the school your child attends or of which you are a governor;
- (c) Statutory sick pay; if you are in receipt
- (d) Allowances, payment or indemnity for members
- (e) Ceremonial honours for members
- (f) Setting Council Tax or precept (subject to arrears exception)

## 3. Outline of objections received

- 3.1 The application for the variation of the premises licence was received on 7<sup>th</sup> November 2018 and sent to all the Responsible Authorities.
- 3.2 There were no representations from any responsible authorities but representations were received from 4 residents within relatively close proximity to the premises. A representation was also received from the Blackheath Society.
- 3.3 The representations received from interested parties, have been examined by Officers and are considered not to be vexatious or frivolous. These representations were all received within the specified time.
- 3.4 The application for the new premises licence has been advertised in accordance with regulation 39, displayed prominently on a notice at the premises, and at the Councils main offices for a period of 28 consecutive days. The last date for receiving representations was the 5<sup>th</sup> December 2018.
- 3.5 The residents are objecting to the new application due to concerns over noise from the premises as well as patrons leaving the venue late at night. The behaviour of patrons

has also been mentioned in objections and concerns have been raised over perceived crime and disorder in and around Blackheath Village.

3.6 In addition, the Blackheath Society have raised an objection on the basis of public safety considering the number of people who will be leaving the premises at 2am and the potential impact on the surrounding area and the transport network. The objections have been sought on these grounds.

## 4. Legal & Human Rights Implications

- 4.1 The Licensing authority is a public authority under the Human Rights Act 1998. Therefore the licensing authority is required to act compatibly with the convention rights in the exercise of their functions. Article 6 (1) of the Convention provides that everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial hearing established by law.
- 4.2 A Premises Licence is a possession for the purpose of the Human Rights Act 1998. The right to hold a licence is a qualified rather than an absolute right. Therefore the right to hold a licence may be interfered with if it affects the interests of local residents or others. Such interference may be justified if it is necessary and proportionate to promote the licensing objectives.

## 5. Equalities Implications

- 5.1 The Equality Act 2010 includes a new public sector equality duty (the equality duty or duties). The duty covers the following nine protected characteristics: age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnerships, pregnancy and maternity, race or religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation.
- 5.2 In summary the Council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:
  - eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Act;
  - advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not;
  - foster good relations between those who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- 5.3 As with the case with the original separate duties, the new duty continues to be a "have regard duty" and the weight to attach to it is a matter for the committee bearing in mind the relevance and proportionality. It is not an absolute requirement to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity or foster good relations.

## 6. <u>Application for the Variation of a Premises Licence</u>

6.1 After having regard to all representations, Members must take such steps as they consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The licensing committee may:

After having regard to all representations, Members must take such steps as they consider necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The licensing committee may:

1. Grant the variation of the premises licence, subject to -

i) the conditions which are consistent with the Operating Schedule modified to such an extent as the authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and

ii) any conditions which must under s19, 20, 21 be included in the licence;2. To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;

3. Refuse to specify the person in the licence as the premises supervisor;

4. Reject the application.

6.2 An appeal may be made against the decision to the Magistrates Court within 21 days.

Any individual carrying out security activities at the premises must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

At least two (2) SIA licensed door supervisors shall be on duty at the entrance of the premises from 21:00 Friday & Saturday until close.

An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised Local Authority or Police Officer, which will record the following:

- a) all crimes reported to the venue
- b) all ejections of patrons
- c) any complaints received
- d) any incidents of disorder
- e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
- f) any faults in the CCTV system
- g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service

The premises must maintain a comprehensive CCTV system. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling facial identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Local Authority or Police Officer throughout the preceding 31 day period.

There shall be a personal licence holder on duty on the premises on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights from 21:00 until close.

The premises shall prominently display signage at all entrances informing customers:-

- There will be no admission or re-admission into the venue after 23:30
- Management reserve the right to refuse entry

The Premises Licence Holder and/or Designated Premises Supervisor shall ensure that the following details for each supervisor are contemporaneously entered into a bound register kept for that purpose:

- 1. Name
- 2. SIA certificate number and/or badge number, or registration number of any accreditation scheme recognised by the Licensing Authority (including expiry date of that registration or accreditation)
- 3. The time they begin duty
- 4. The time they complete their duty
- 5. The full details of any agency through which they have been allocated to work at the premises if appropriate.

The register shall be available at all reasonable times to the Licensing Authority or Police.

The register is to be kept at the premises at all times and shall be so maintained as to enable an authorised officer to establish particulars of all door staff engaged at the premises during the period of not less than 12 months of request.

At the commencement of work security personnel should ensure that they are recorded on the CCTV system and that a clear head and shoulders image showing their face clear of any hat, glasses or other obstruction is recorded.

A promotion risk assessment form will be completed and submitted to the Metropolitan Police for any events other than regular resident DJ's no later than 14 days before the event is due to take place.

Capacities will not exceed 100 on the ground floor and 100 in the basement and the capacity for the first floor set in accordance with the numbers set out by the London Fire Brigade.

I wish to lodge my strong objection to the application for variation to the licence dated 9th November, to increase the licence terms that currently exist, also to the continued use of this site as a nightclub, which is a separate issue in itself. I moved into my flat at 2a Montpelier Vale on 3rd October and the volume of music noise and constant screaming from patrons when leaving the venue is a constant disturbance to my enjoyment of my new flat. Furthermore, i have to endure not just the drunken behaviour, but on some occasions suffer the vomit and urine that is left outside my entrance in the porch way.

It has become so bad that every Friday evening, i am now forced to stay at my parents house in Kent and return Monday evening after work, as i cannot sleep due to the barrage of highly audible noise and antisocial behaviour of the many. This venue is a constant nuisance and has caused me numerous unpleasant nights listening to the disorder and sometimes disturbing scenes that i am forced to endure outside the club into the early hours.

If this application is allowed to prevail, then i shall have to vacate the flat for my own ability to sleep at the weekend, aside from which, i have found the behaviour anti-social and very worrying for my safety, were i to venture out late at night. My landlord is aware of the problem and i understand is the reason why his last tenant was forced to vacate.

I invite you to witness the noise and behaviour from within my flat on the evening of 22nd December, when i would come back to allow you entry and i do have historical video evidence of the terrific noise emitted from the club, taken from the street outside. Kindly confirm the time up to midnight and i shall be there.

## Blackheath Society submission re Morden's Licensing Application

## Introduction

The Blackheath Society objects to the current application from Morden's Wine Bar for variations to the current licence. We are clearly an interested party as a local society. We base our objections on the four licensing objectives, which Lewisham Council is charged to promote.

Blackheath Village is just as much a residential area as a retail and leisure destination. Because of its configuration, retail units and residential homes are difficult to separate. Indeed, most of the licensed premises, including Morden's are adjacent to or in very close proximity to private residences. The population of Blackheath Village comprises families, single people, young children and the elderly.

Blackheath is subject to a Cumulative Impact Policy (CIP) which means, to quote Lewisham's current Licensing Policy (p. 27):

'The effect of the CIP in respect of Blackheath Village and The New Cross Corridor is that the Licensing Authority will refuse applications for a new premises license or club premises certificate, or material variations of an existing license or certificate, whenever it receives relevant representation unless an applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the negative cumulative impact already being experienced'.

#### Public nuisance

Residents currently suffer from noise both from the operation of the premises and customers leaving in the early morning. Any variation to the licence which increases the number or timing of late customers, opens the garden beyond the current 23.00 limit and permits 'regulated entertainment' (music) on levels above the current basement will add to these problems.

020 8297 1937 office@blackheath.org www.blackheath.org At the time of the last major licensing application the manager of Morden's (at that time called Cave Austin) wrote to the Blackheath Village Residents Group. He referred to the problem of 'people trying to gain entry after the other premises have closed' which 'may cause some disruption to the village, especially at the front door...the ground floor is obviously visible to people walking past the premises which causes the problem of people leaving other premises trying to gain entry'. He continues:

'We have thought long and hard about how to stop this problem and have come to the conclusion that one extra hour in the basement area only and closing the ground floor at midnight will make things a lot easier and a lot quieter'.

We see no reason why this analysis does not hold good now as then, and find the reason given for the application, 'this allows for better management' to be vague and unpersuasive.

### Public Nuisance/Public Safety

If the application were to be granted, there would be large numbers of people leaving Morden's after 2.00 am on Saturday and Sunday mornings. At this time, most public transport will have stopped running. Residents and others face the prospect of large numbers of potentially noisy people either walking home through the village, causing disturbance in the early hours, or congregating outside the night bus stop. Even more worryingly, large groups of people would congregate at the taxi office next to Blackheath station. The prospect of groups of tired, inebriated people fighting for a limited number of taxis is not an attractive one.

There is a reasonable expectation that the grant of an extension to Morden's licence, under the proposed terms, would increase the risk of contravention of the licensing objectives. It is certainly the case that the applicant has not, as required by Lewisham's licensing policy, 'demonstrate[d] why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the negative cumulative impact already being experienced' and the application should therefore be refused.

I own the head lease of the whole building and as such, shall now find it extremely difficult to find a tenant for the flat due to the terrific noise and disorder arising from the continued trading of this nightclub.

Until the early hours of the morning, aside from the high volume of music noise from the resident D.J., it is quite usual for persons leaving he premises, to vomit and urinate in the various doorways along Montpelier Vale, including my own doorway and that of John Payne opposite, furthermore the continuous screaming of drunken persons causes massive disturbance to sleep and is very alarming and upsetting to, in particular residents above my shop at 2 Montpelier Vale, which is almost directly opposite Mordens.

I am writing regarding the application of full variation of licence for Morden's Wine bar of 7-9 Montpelier Vale, Blackheath.

As you will see from the string of emails below, I have raised concerns with the council about Morden's Wine Bar on many occasions. I was very disappointed that no constructive action was taken despite my many complaints, and I eventually gave up filing complaints as it is exhausting to get up in the middle of the night on most weekends to keep a diary of all the specific incidents. This does not mean that the concerns I mentioned in my emails at the time have been resolved. There is disorder every weekend outside the bar as people gather and leave, and the members of staff do nothing to encourage them to leave quietly. Of course by that time, most people are very drunk which also contributes to disorderly behaviour, and presents danger for the cars as people cross the street or stand in the middle of it without paying any attention to ongoing traffic. As a result, there are honking cars in the middle of the night, which also adds to the overall noise nuisance.

There have been many occasions when the police have had to intervene because of fights happening in the street, sometimes right outside our front door. Some of these fights involved members of staff, as you'll see from the detailed descriptions in my emails below.

Blackheath is a friendly, quiet community and it's pretty shocking that this sort of behaviour is tolerated right in the middle of the village on a regular basis.

We were horrified to learn that Morden's Wine Bar applied to extend the licensing hours for the bar that is at street level as there are no double doors or appropriate soundproofing, so the music and overall noise are heard in our flat at levels which are not acceptable. According to the <u>Environmental Protection Act 1990</u>, any noise is considered a <u>'statutory nuisance'</u> if :

it unreasonably and substantially interferes with the use or enjoyment of a home or other premises
it injures health or is likely to injure health.

On a Friday or Saturday night from 10 pm, reading a book or sleeping is impossible due the level of noise in the flat because of the extremely loud music and extra outbursts every time people open the wine bar's door to go in or out. When music is played so loud and so late, double doors should be compulsory. As a result of the levels of noise and the stress / lack of sleep incurred, I have been experiencing migraines. It is incredibly painful when I feel unwell and have to endure this unbearable amount of noise and disruption for hours.

Based on the evidence submitted in this email and my previous emails below, I hope you will not grant any extension of licensing hours to Morden's Wine Bar, and I would like to use this opportunity to ask you to reconsider the current licensing hours to ensure that there is no noise coming from the premises between 11pm and 7am as stated by the law. Instead of being

extended, hours for alcohol consumption (currently 12.00 midnight) on the premises should be reduced to 11pm on upper floors and regulated entertainment (i.e music) should not be permitted on the upper floors after 11pm.

I trust you will take this email seriously and I look forward to hearing from you regarding my concerns.

Thank you for your efforts to date, and I have not been in touch because at the weekend you sent your officers the club was quiet which made me wonder if they get notified about the visits? I was a bit disheartened to be honest as it seems so difficult to get any lasting results. However Mordens continues to be a nuisance and I am a bit puzzled why your officers have to witness it as you can simply get in touch with the police and check their records as they have been called to fights taking place in the club in the summer.

I am sure you are aware that the young men was murdered in Blackheath village last weekend a few meters from my flat, so I don't think you can go on denying that antisocial behaviour is not a huge issue in the village at the weekends.

I have witnessed numerous fights and shouting and as it is happening outside my windows basically every weekend I am not able to sleep first due to the loud music coming out of the club and then woken up by screaming and antisocial behaviour of people leaving or trying to get into the club. It is obvious that Mordens attracts a certain type of people who wreak havoc in the village. Last Saturday/ Sunday morning police were dealing with two incidents at the same time on Montpelier Vale - one on the top of the hill and one outside Mordens.

And as usual at 2.00 am there was a singing and loud talking when people were leaving the club. I think you should seriously consider revoking the license for the club to operate. As my simple request to turn the music down after 10.00 pm has not had any result. Can you let me know if you are going to take any serious actions to make the Blackheath village safer and quieter place to live at the weekend? I have attached a couple of pictures from Sunday morning.

I also reside at this address and find your response from 23 September 2015 stating that your officers did find sufficient evidence to back the complaint simply unacceptable. Over the years I witnessed numerous occasions when the police were called to deal with Mordens customers or staff ( last year their security person was taken away in handcuffs for hitting a customer) this is just to set the scene!

Every single weekend from Thursday night to Sunday night from 22.30 the music can be heard in the flat at 12 A Montpelier Vale even with the windows closed (double glazing) – I dread to think about the summer when we have to have windows open as the flat gets really hot. Even louder bursts of music can be heard when people enter and leave the bar and the door is open. It is impossible to fall asleep with music resonating through my body but once I succeed out of exhaustion I get woken up by the drunk crowd leaving the club, hanging around, shouting and singing every weekend. This was the case on Saturday 9 April and on Saturday 16 April at 2.10 am. It is affecting my health and well-being as the noise and not being able to sleep makes me tired and irritable. I attached a picture taken after **2.00 am** last weekend.

Also I would like to mention that on occasions people are allowed to enter or re-enter after 23.30 which I believe is against their licence. I witnessed people queuing and being let in at 12.18 am on 27 February 2016.

I would like to request a further investigation is undertaken and the management at Mordens finally takes responsibility for the noise coming out of the bar and managing their clients also once they leave their premises. Now they just shut the door and do not care which shows the total lack of respect for the local residents. I suggest your officers visit on Friday after 22.30 and on Saturday at 2.00 am to get the feel of it.

I am happy for your officers to come to the flat as well to inspect the noise levels but here are simple steps which I believe Crime, Enforcement and Regulation service should advise management at the Mordnes bar to undertake to protect the well-being of people living nearby:

1. Turn the music down so it cannot be heard outside their premises

2. Brief every person entering the club they must leave quietly and mustn't make any noise and then have security staff in place to enforce it.

3. Installing another door at the entrance to the bar to minimise the noise when people enter and leave.

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We were horrified to learn that Morden's Wine Bar applied to extend the licensing hours for the bar that is at street level as there are no double doors or appropriate soundproofing, so the music and overall noise are heard in our flat at levels which are not acceptable. According to the Environmental Protection Act 1990, any noise is considered a <u>'statutory nuisance'</u> if :

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extended, hours for alcohol consumption (currently 12.00 midnight) on the premises should be reduced to 11pm on upper floors and regulated entertainment (i.e music) should not be permitted on the upper floors after 11pm.

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Thank you for your efforts to date, and I have not been in touch because at the weekend you sent your officers the club was quiet which made me wonder if they get notified about the visits? I was a bit disheartened to be honest as it seems so difficult to get any lasting results. However Mordens continues to be a nuisance and I am a bit puzzled why your officers have to witness it as you can simply get in touch with the police and check their records as they have been called to fights taking place in the club in the summer.

I am sure you are aware that the young men was murdered in Blackheath village last weekend a few meters from my flat, so I don't think you can go on denying that antisocial behaviour is not a huge issue in the village at the weekends.

I have witnessed numerous fights and shouting and as it is happening outside my windows basically every weekend I am not able to sleep first due to the loud music coming out of the club and then woken up by screaming and antisocial behaviour of people leaving or trying to get into the club. It is obvious that Mordens attracts a certain type of people who wreak havoc in the village. Last Saturday/ Sunday morning police were dealing with two incidents at the same time on Montpelier Vale - one on the top of the hill and one outside Mordens.

And as usual at 2.00 am there was a singing and loud talking when people were leaving the club. I think you should seriously consider revoking the license for the club to operate. As my simple request to turn the music down after 10.00 pm has not had any result. Can you let me know if you are going to take any serious actions to make the Blackheath village safer and quieter place to live at the weekend? I have attached a couple of pictures from Sunday morning.




