Report title: Expansion of Drumbeat School – Decision Report

Date: 6 July 2022

Outline and recommendations

This report provides the results of the statutory period of representation conducted on the proposal to expand the permanent capacity of Drumbeat School from 223 places to 270 places with an updated anticipated implementation of January 2023, with the majority of places provided via the medium-term use of spare capacity at Turnham Academy. The report then goes on to seek a decision from the Mayor and Cabinet (as LA Statutory Decision Maker) to enable this expansion to take place.

The Mayor and Cabinet are recommended:

- to note the results of the period of representation conducted on the proposal to expand Drumbeat School.
- to agree to the proposal that Drumbeat School & ASD Service be expanded from 223 places to 270 places with a modified implementation date of January 2023.
- to delegate authority to the Executive Director for Children and Young People to procure and award the necessary construction contracts

1. Summary

- 1.1 The report feeds back on the representation period and seeks a decision from the Mayor and Cabinet regarding the proposed expansion of Drumbeat School, with an amended implementation date of January 2023 (rather than September 2022). The proposed expansion will allow the school to cater for 270 students (up from 223) by January 2023.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 The Mayor and Cabinet are recommended:
- 2.2 to note the results of the period of representation conducted on the proposal to expand Drumbeat School.
- 2.3 to agree to the proposal that Drumbeat School be expanded from 223 places to 270 places with a modified implementation date of January 2023.
- 2.4 to delegate authority to the Executive Director for Children and Young People to procure and award the necessary construction contracts

3. Policy Context

- 3.1 The proposal to expand Drumbeat School will contribute to the following key priority outcomes of Lewisham's Corporate Strategy 2018-2022:
- 3.2 Giving children and young people the best start in life – every child has access to an outstanding and inspiring education and is given the support they need to keep them safe, well and able to achieve their full potential.
- 3.3 And specifically helps deliver against the commitment to increase the provision for children with special educational needs to meet children's learning need within the borough.
- 3.4 The Local Authority has a duty to ensure the provision of sufficient places for pupils of statutory school age

Place Planning Strategy 2017-22

- 3.5 A recommendation of the 2016 Lewisham Education Commission Report was for the Council to develop a new 5 year Place Planning Strategy that succeeded the Primary Strategy for Change. Officers reviewed what had gone on before and what needs to be achieved in the future, and the draft strategy went through a public consultation process. The strategy was approved by Mayor and Cabinet on 22 March 2017.
- 3.6 Within the strategy the council committed to constantly review its forecasting to ensure that the supply of school places met need as accurately as possible, as both undersupply and oversupply can have knock on effects on school standards and finances.
- 3.7 Within this the strategy also highlights the need to review the provision we have within the borough that caters for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), to ensure that the correct provision is provided in the right place at the right time.

School Organisation Requirements

- 3.8 Proposals to expand a Special School must comply with the provisions set out in *The Education and Inspections Act 2006 (EIA 2006)* and *The School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2013*. These set

out the statutory process for making changes to a school, and statutory guidance on making changes to a maintained school indicates 4 stages to making a prescribed alteration to a maintained school. These are:

- 1) Publication of a Statutory Notice
- 2) Representation period
- 3) Decision making
- 4) Implementation

3.9 In the case of a community school (which Drumbeat School is) the Local Authority must propose and conduct the publication and representation periods, with the Mayor and Cabinet (as statutory decision maker) then making the decision.

4. Background

4.1 In 2019, Lewisham Council started the coproduction and consultation process for the Local Area SEND Strategy which was due to be launched in 2020. From the consultation a number of areas were highlighted as gaps in current provision across the Council. One of these was around sufficiency and place planning. Therefore, as part of the SEND Strategy there is a work stream on Sufficiency, and Place Planning. To ensure that the plan reflected the current picture of gaps in provision a number of data exercises were carried out.

4.2 The data continues to show an increasing demand for specialist provision for children and young people with Autism. Currently (May 2022) there are 1170 EHC plans where autism has been identified as the primary area of difference. This is over one third of the number of EHC plans that are issued by Lewisham, 3359.

4.3 As such the proposal to expand Drumbeat School comes as part of a wider piece of work that the council is undertaking to enable more Lewisham young people to be educated in Lewisham schools. This specifically links in with the proposals to add SEN provision's into two Lewisham primary schools (Edmund Waller and Forster Park), which together with this proposal will provide an additional 84 SEN places within the next 12 months.

4.4 In academic year 2021-2022, to date, Drumbeat have received 224 consultations for places within the school. From those consultations they were able to meet the needs of 80 pupils but did not have the capacity within the school. These young people are now being educated in Independent Placements outside of Lewisham.

4.5 In the same time period, the primary autism resource bases have received 30 consultations where they felt that they were able to meet needs but did not have the capacity to.

4.6 All provisions for students with autism are over their commissioned numbers and the demand for these specialist places continue to grow.

4.7 Subsequently this proposal seeks to cater for this increase in demand and reduce the need to place out of Borough, and deliver an immediate increase in ASD places. Thus far, Drumbeat School have been able to go over number by 10% as allowable by the statutory guidance, and so currently caters for 223 pupils. However for the school to increase its numbers further this statutory consultation process must take place.

4.8 The need for a number of these places already exists, as can be shown by the pressure to commission additional ASD places outside of Lewisham as Drumbeat School is currently full and therefore in effect oversubscribed. These commissioned places outside of the Borough, are often in expensive, and distant, independent

provision.

- 4.9 The objective of the proposal is to utilise additional capacity within school buildings to accommodate the increase in demand for ASD provision within the borough and reduce the need to commission out of borough placements, as placing young people in provision that is further afield does not benefit the young person in terms of social inclusion or a sense of community. There is often an extensive amount of travel time (often in isolation) which is disadvantageous also. The ability to cater for our young people and their families close to home will allow the wider range of support systems to function in the best interests of those young people and their families.
- 4.10 The proposal would build on the good (with outstanding features) Ofsted rated standards for teaching and learning already in place at the school and provide additional places without having any negative impact on other schools, academies and educational institutions in the area. The proposal would also have a positive impact on travel distance/time for some students.

Implementation of the proposal

- 4.11 The additional places proposed would enable the school to grow to admit up to 270 pupils in total. This may not occur on the date of first expansion. It is not possible to be more specific as each year group is a different size, dictated by need.
- 4.12 To achieve this expansion, the Council will be utilising spare space within the school which will be re-purposed to provide appropriate teaching accommodation and will also be utilising spare space on an additional site, which can be converted and accessed swiftly to help accommodate children as soon as possible. The additional site (part of Turnham Academy, Turnham Road, SE4 2HH) is currently underutilised due to a fall in primary pupil numbers (across London), and will be repurposed to provide a suitable environment for some of the primary cohort within Drumbeat, allowing the school as a whole to grow. This approach ensures that pupil movement will be kept to a minimum. The Local Authority, School and STEP Academy Trust (of which Turnham Academy is a part) are all working together to enable the expansion.

Effect on other educational institutions in the area

- 4.13 Whilst a major portion of the expansion will be accommodated on another school site (Turnham Academy) it is not anticipated that the proposed expansion of Drumbeat School will have any detrimental impact on other educational facilities within the local area. Turnham Academy is built as a 3 Form of Entry school (630 places total), and currently has 250 pupils on roll (as at Spring Census 2022). The proposal has been made to accommodate the increase in pupil numbers that is being experienced within the Borough and to reduce the reliance on out of borough provision. STEP Academy Trust, both Schools and the Local Authority are all working together to provide local places for Lewisham young people with ASD.
- 4.14 The use of Turnham Academy for this expansion in roll of Drumbeat School will be a temporary medium-term measure utilising spare capacity whilst the council seeks further opportunities to expand Drumbeat School physically.

5. Publication & Representation

- 5.1 The statutory notice and proposal for the expansion of Drumbeat School were published on 13 May 2022, with the representation period running for 5 weeks until 17 June 2022.

5.2 As well as being published in the local press and on the Lewisham website, the proposal was distributed to all parents, carers and staff at both Drumbeat School and Turnham Academy.

5.3 A public consultation meeting was held at Turnham Academy on Monday 23 May for interested parties to attend, to discuss the proposals and pose further questions.

5.4 During the period of representation the council received a single response which is detailed below, with officer comments in response.

5.5 *Building work should take place during school holidays, evenings and weekends to avoid any impact on Turnham students*

Every effort will be made to undertake disruptive/intrusive works outside of school hours, but some level of works will have to take place during term time. We will work with the school on this, and would also point out that we do have experience of carrying out construction works at Turnham during term time previously.

5.6 *Turnham should retain enough classroom space to expand to two form entry school if numbers of applicants increase. I consider this likely once the school gets Ofsted result and new community facilities such as the state of the art football pitches are up and running.*

Turnham has enough spare classrooms on both the lower floor and top floor to accommodate for an increase if the school numbers were to increase.

5.7 *Turnham is expecting a long awaited Ofsted inspection, it would be a disaster if some element of the new set up (e.g. an overlooked safeguarding technicality) negatively affected their in the rating. Every effort, including pushing back timeline if needed, should be taken to ensure this doesn't happen. School leaders at Turnham should be provided with training on how to pre-empt any questions Ofsted might ask about the new set up.*

School leaders would ensure that all safeguarding, health & safety processes and procedures were discussed with all stakeholders and Drumbeat staff. The Trust would also conduct its due diligence in liaison with the school leaders as part of Ofsted preparation.

5.8 *Linked to the above, school governors should be provided with the safeguarding considerations to check over.*

The Turnham Executive Headteacher/Head of School, will update the Chair of Governors on a regular basis and provide updates in the AC Headteacher report and at meetings to all governors.

5.9 *A broader point for both school leaders to consider. One of the advantages of this proposal as I understand it is children seeing and valuing difference. This was also raised as an advantage when I met a parent of a pupil at Turnham. However the proposed set up as I understand it is very much separate (separate entrances, separate break times, separate uniform etc). If there's no interaction between the two sets of pupils I'm not sure the valuing difference element will work. Could there be some overlap, even something small like e.g. a group of pupils from both schools plan and deliver a joint assembly at the start of term.*

This will be discussed and organised as appropriate with school leaders from both schools. However it should be noted that there will be an adjustment and transition time for Drumbeat pupils. Entrances are separate to keep all children safe. When the children are settled and adjusted then the school leaders will look at joint projects to work on.

- 5.10 *I appreciate that not 100% of the money that Drumbeat pay Turnham Academy for rent will go to Turnham Academy to spend, some will go into the STEP trust to spend at other schools. However I would want a significant amount of the money raised to be hypothecated directly to Turnham Academy , to compensate the Turnham pupils for the reduction in rooms and spaces they will lose (e.g. the library, their museum room etc)*

This is not part of the consultation and is a separate matter between the two schools. It is not appropriate to provide any comment.

- 5.11 Officers have completed the statutory process fully and have considered the representations made and recommend that the Mayor and Cabinet agree to the expansion of Drumbeat School from 223 to 270 places, with a revised implementation date of January 2023.

6. Factors relevant to a making a decision on school organisation proposals

When making a decision on a school organisation proposal the Decision Maker must consider the following factors:

6.1 Consideration of consultation and representation period

The decision-maker will need to be satisfied that the appropriate consultation and/or representation period has been carried out and that the proposer has had regard to the responses received. If the proposer has failed to meet the statutory requirements, a proposal may be deemed invalid and therefore should be rejected. The decision-maker must consider all the views submitted, including all support for, objections to and comments on the proposal.

The consultation has been undertaken in accordance with the statutory requirements. Stakeholders have been involved in the development of the proposals. The notices have been published as required (See appendix 1 & 2). All views submitted have been reported to the decision maker in 5.5 to 5.10 above.

6.2 Education standards and diversity of provision

Decision-makers should consider the quality and diversity of schools in the relevant area and whether the proposal will meet or affect the needs of parents, raise local standards and narrow attainment gaps.

This expansion will allow the local authority to better meet the needs of our children and young people, by ensuring that our specialist provision is suitable for both the current and future cohort. Specifically the proposal will help cater for our growing number of children with ASD.

6.3 Equal opportunity issues

The decision-maker must comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED), which requires them to have 'due regard' to the need to:

- eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Equality Act 2010;
- advance equality of opportunity between people who share a relevant protected characteristic and people who do not share it; and
- foster good relations between people who share a relevant protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

In developing this proposal the Council has had regards to its statutory responsibilities under section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. The proposal does not have any adverse effect on equal opportunity, and in fact helps the council deliver services that meet the needs of those with special educational needs and disabilities.

6.4 **Community cohesion**

Schools have a key part to play in providing opportunities for young people from different backgrounds to learn with, from, and about each other; by encouraging through their teaching, an understanding of, and respect for, other cultures, faiths and communities. When considering a proposal, the decision-maker should consider its impact on community cohesion. This will need to be considered on a case-by-case basis, taking account of the community served by the school and the views of different groups within the community.

The proposal does not have any adverse effect on community cohesion. In fact it should have a positive impact on the local community as there will be an increase in places for pupils with a diagnosis of ASD, ensuring that more pupils can attend school closer to home rather than having to attend provision outside of the borough.

6.5 **Travel and accessibility**

Decision-makers should satisfy themselves that accessibility planning has been properly taken into account and the proposed changes should not adversely impact on disadvantaged groups.

The decision-maker should bear in mind that a proposal should not unreasonably extend journey times or increase transport costs, or result in too many children being prevented from travelling sustainably due to unsuitable walking or cycling routes. A proposal should also be considered on the basis of how it will support and contribute to the LA's duty to promote the use of sustainable travel and transport to school.

The proposal will enable more students to access specialist provision more locally, reducing the need for travel to out of borough provision, and as such actually has a positive impact on travel and accessibility.

6.6 **Funding**

The decision-maker should be satisfied that any necessary funding required to implement the proposal will be available and that all relevant local parties (e.g. trustees of the school, diocese or relevant diocesan board) have given their agreement. A proposal **cannot** be approved conditionally upon funding being made available.

Where proposers are relying on the department as the source of capital funding, there can be no assumption that the approval of a proposal will trigger the release of capital funds from the department, unless the department has previously confirmed in writing that such resources will be available; nor can any allocation 'in principle' be increased. In such circumstances the proposal should be rejected, or consideration deferred until it is clear that the capital necessary to implement the proposal will be provided.

Feasibility work has been conducted to identify any additional capital works required to enable the spare capacity at Turnham Academy to be both fit for purpose and used in a safe manner. Capital funding has been identified within the CYP Asset Management Fund.

6.7 The Mayor and Cabinet are recommended to agree the proposal to expand Drumbeat School from 223 to 270 places from an amended implementation date of January 2023

7. **Financial implications**

Capital Financial Implications

- 7.1 It is estimated that £498k capital funding is required for this project. This is available within the capital programme as is currently unallocated within CYP resources.

Revenue Financial Implications

- 7.2 This report provides the results of the statutory period of representation conducted on the proposal to expand the permanent capacity of Drumbeat School from 223 places to 270 places with an updated anticipated implementation of January 2023, with the majority of places provided via the medium-term use of spare capacity at Turnham Academy.
- 7.3 In line with all Local Authorities, SEN need is currently outstripping the provision available especially within Lewisham.
- 7.4 The establishment of the resource base is part of a mitigation plan being progressed with Schools Forum and Schools to meet demand and reduce costs especially those associated with high cost out of borough placements
- 7.5 There are no direct financial implications for the General Fund. However, transport is funded from the General Fund, it is anticipated that should a pupil placed at this provision with transport associated costs, the position would be more favourable than an out borough placement
- 7.6 The revenue income and expenditure for these additional places forms part of the High Needs Block within the Dedicated Schools Grant funding. As previously stated, this provision should support Lewisham strategy towards reducing costs

8. Legal implications

- 8.1 The Human Rights Act 1998 safeguards the rights of children in the borough to educational provision, which the local authority is empowered to provide in accordance with its duties under domestic legislation.
- 8.2 Section 14 of the Education Act 1996 obliges each local authority to ensure that there are sufficient primary and secondary school places available for its area i.e. the London Borough of Lewisham, although there is no requirement that those places should be exclusively in the area. The Authority is not itself obliged to provide all the schools required, but to secure that they are available.
- 8.3 In exercising its responsibilities under section 14 of the Education Act 1996 a local authority must do so with a view to securing diversity in the provision of schools and increasing opportunities for parental choice.
- 8.4 The Education and Inspections Act 2006 places requirements on local authorities to make their significant strategic decisions concerning the number and variety of school places in their localities against two overriding criteria:
- to secure schools likely to maximise student potential and achievement;
 - to secure diversity and choice in the range of school places on offer.

Section 19 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 provides that where a local authority or the governing body of a maintained school proposes to make a prescribed alteration to a maintained school and it is permitted to make that alteration, it must publish proposals.

- 8.5 The School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2013 provide that an expansion of a maintained Special School is a

prescribed alteration which means that statutory proposals have to be published, and there must be a period of four weeks for representations before a decision is made. Proposals to expand a Special School will be determined by the local authority as decision maker.

- 8.6 The relevant Guidance advises that the Mayor as decision maker will need to be satisfied that the appropriate consultation and/or statutory representation process has been carried out and that the proposer has had regard to the responses received. The Mayor must consider all the views submitted, including all support for, objections to and comments on the proposals.
- 8.7 Any decision to expand Drumbeat School should be taken in the light of the representations received to the statutory consultation and the DfE Guidance for Decision-Makers attached at Appendix 3.
- 8.8 Decisions must be made within a period of two months of the end of the representation period or be referred to the Schools Adjudicator.

Equalities Legislation

- 8.9 The Equality Act 2010 (the Act) introduced a public sector equality duty (the equality duty or the duty). It covers the following protected characteristics: age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation.
- 8.10 In summary, the Council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:
- eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Act.
 - advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
 - foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- 8.11 It is not an absolute requirement to eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation or other prohibited conduct, or to promote equality of opportunity or foster good relations between persons who share a protected characteristic and those who do not. It is a duty to have due regard to the need to achieve the goals listed at 8.10 above.
- 8.12 The weight to be attached to the duty will be dependent on the nature of the decision and the circumstances in which it is made. This is a matter for the Mayor, bearing in mind the issues of relevance and proportionality. The Mayor must understand the impact or likely impact of the decision on those with protected characteristics who are potentially affected by the decision. The extent of the duty will necessarily vary from case to case and due regard is such regard as is appropriate in all the circumstances.
- 8.13 The Equality and Human Rights Commission has issued Technical Guidance on the Public Sector Equality Duty and statutory guidance entitled "Equality Act 2010 Services, Public Functions & Associations Statutory Code of Practice". The Council must have regard to the statutory code in so far as it relates to the duty and attention is drawn to Chapter 11 which deals particularly with the equality duty. The Technical Guidance also covers what public authorities should do to meet the duty. This includes steps that are legally required, as well as recommended actions. The guidance does not have statutory force but nonetheless regard should be had to it, as failure to do so without compelling reason would be of evidential value. 8.15 The essential guide provides an overview of the equality duty requirements including the general equality duty, the specific duties and who they apply to. It covers what public authorities should do to meet the duty including steps that are legally required, as well as recommended actions. 10.1 The reduction in students travelling long distances to appropriate provision, and a lesser reliance on transport will have a positive benefit regarding emissions and helping tackle the climate emergency.

11. Crime and disorder implications

11.1 There are no crime and disorder implications.

12. Health and wellbeing implications

12.1 The provision of additional ASD school places within Lewisham will have a positive impact on the health and wellbeing of students and their families. Reducing the amount of travel that they have to endure, and also ensuring that they are educated closer to home and their home communities.
