

Increase in benefits claimants


Increase in council tax arrears

Emergence of new vulnerabilities

- Vulnerable groups are already disproportionally affected
- But we are also seeing new groups at risk
 - Single-earner families with dependents, and larger families: income might not be sufficient to meet increase in living cost
 - Out-of-work families, families receiving benefits: might have minimal buffer as benefits have not kept up with inflation
 - Private and social renters tend to be more financially vulnerable than homeowners: may have smaller savings buffer
 - People over 50 who are now no longer working more people entered early retirement during pandemic, nationally and in Lewisham.

What we've done so far

Launch warm welcomes in libraries and community assets

Food justice action plan – consultation launched

Supporting improvement of the least energy efficient housing stock

Highlighting Warmer Homes Fund to residents

Rolling out national benefit initiatives

Household Support Fund: supporting vulnerable residents with the cost of food and utility bills

Improving take-up of pension credits

Lewisham Works – supporting residents into work

Develop resources for residents worried about money – where they can go for support

Upcoming plans

Funding for community food supply

Data-led projects to identify residents in need of support and intervention

Targeted debt advice for residents facing complex debt and financial hardship

In-work employment support for low-paid workers

Developing funding opportunities to enhance warm welcomes across the borough

Invest in social prescribing and community transport offer

Third Household Support Fund – Free School Meals; supporting 800 households who haven't been able to access other gov initiatives; £100k for energy efficiency support

Warm Welcomes

Warm spaces to go for anyone who needs a warm, inviting space

Libraries - read a book, chat to a friend or volunteer, or do some homework

Community partners developing their own offers

Lewisham Local are coordinating a map of all the available spaces

Small grants programme in development – help local community organisations with costs of running a Warm Welcome offer
