Meeting notes

Your local assembly, your say!

1. Welcome and introduction to the meeting.

From Councillor Alan Hall.

2. Bellingham Festival Film

lyare Igiehon introduced the film that he made about the Bellingham Festival and the community in Bellingham.

3. Assembly Fund (remaining funding)

Councillor Hall explained that there is £5,069 of available funding remaining. This is a combination of £1,319 unspent Assembly Fund and the £3,750 councillors discretionary fund.

He explained that the co-ordinating group are asking the assembly to vote if the remaining funding should be spent on Bellingham's festivals for 2013, with the following split of funds:

£2,535 Bellingham Festival

£1,584 Home Park Family Fun Day

£950 Carols on the Green

Q: It was asked how much the festivals will cost in total.

A: It was explained that the funds will secure the festivals to take place, though more funding will be applied for.

Everyone that signed in to the assembly had a voting card and 100% of the participants were in favour of funding the three festivals.

4. Update from Bellingham Safer Neighbourhood Team

Sergeant Chris Ellen spoke to the Assembly.

Olympic staffing

It was explained that during the Olympics many officers were unfortunately diverted away from Bellingham to help manage policing at the Olympic venues.

Open Futures Project

The Safer Neighbourhood Team, Bellingham Community Project and Lewisham Youth Service are partnering to run this project which aims to divert young people away from crime and build on life skills and work experience to give them the right start in life.

Bellingham Ward Panel

It was asked if anyone would like to join the Bellingham Ward Panel. This is a community meeting where residents decide on the priorities that they would like to police to work on to help solve safety and crime issues in Bellingham Ward.

Contact

It was reiterated that the Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) need to know about issues to solve them and are contactable on 020 8721 2489 or at Bellingham.snt@met.police.uk. It was explained that the SNT's number is not 24 hours if there is an emergency please call 999.

Neighbourhood Watch

It was explained that if you would like to set up a Neighbourhood Watch group in your area, the SNT can support you and offer all the materials needed and help with promotion.

Preventable Crime

It was explained that many crimes are preventable and to always check windows and doors are closed

Critical Incident Panel

It was explained that there are certain members of the community that are on the critical incident panel, if a critical incident happens the SNT contacts them.

Bellingham Ward Priorities

1. Randlestone Road - No Drinking Zone

This is now in force up to Sedgehill Road. There were a small number of street drinkers but there was a great deal of rubbish and there were incidents of anti-social behaviour by the alley by the side of the pub before the zone was in place.

2. Sedgehill School - Turnout issues

Due to the size of Sedgehill School officers attend at the end of the school day to help manage the flow of the young people around bus stops and travelling out of the area.

3. Riverview Park / Lushington Road

It was explained that these are areas to show a police presence. The stabbings at Beckenham Hill station had an effect on the number of young people going to the DUMPs adventure playground. The SNT are working with the DUMPs and showing a presence and numbers are increasing.

Metal Detectors

It was explained that British Transport police have mobile metal detectors that are brought randomly to different stations.

Sedgehill School Weapons Sweep

It was stated that there was a surprise weapons sweep at Sedgehill school and no weapons were found. It was commented that residents thought weapons were found in the privet hedges on the day of the sweep.

Beckenham Hill Incident

It was confirmed that the CCTV on Beckenham Hill did not catch the incident due to their being a train on the platform.

3. Have the priorities changed

- youth, antisocial behaviour and environment
- more care support for the disabled and less abled
- youth provision need to include employment training and apprenticeships

- antisocial behaviour does not feel as pressing an issue as some of the other priorities
