1 - Individual Electoral Registration

Information to take away

In June 2014, one of the most significant changes in electoral administration for almost 100 years took place when Individual Electoral Registration (IER) was introduced. Under the old system, one person completed the registration form on behalf of all the people in the property. Under IER people have to apply to register individually.

For the first time, people can make their application online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. It takes as little as three minutes to apply and you need to provide your name, address, date of birth and National Insurance number.

Transitional arrangements

Earlier this year the details of those already on the electoral register under the old system were checked against Department for Work and Pensions records. Those whose details could be matched were transferred automatically onto the new electoral register and the Council's Electoral Services sent a letter to confirm this. Those who did not transfer automatically were invited to re-register under the new system, sent reminders and canvassed in person to encourage them to re-apply under the new system.

Removal from the register

By law, those who did not go on to the new electoral register under the transitional arrangements, or by registering afresh under IER, will be removed from the electoral register in December 2016. However, postal and proxy voters who were not automatically transferred, or who do not subsequently re-register under the new system will not now be able to cast their vote by post or by proxy, including at the 2015 General Election. Though they will still be able to vote in person at the polling station, they need to apply afresh if they want to vote by post or proxy.

What you need to do

If you have received a letter saying that you are registered under the new system and none of your details have changed, you do not need to do anything.

If you have received an Invitation to Register (either as a current or new elector) then you need to complete the application form either online or by completing the paper form which Electoral Services sent you.

If you have moved, you can register online or contact electoral services for a form to be sent to you.

If your details have changed (for example, your surname has changed through marriage), or if you want to have a postal vote, please contact us and we will advise you what you need to do. If you are unsure about your entry on the register please contact us and we will check for you.

What is happening next?

At the beginning of February 2015 we will be writing to all households in the borough with the details of the people we currently have registered at that address.

Please watch out for it and check that all the details we have are correct. If you have any changes to make, instructions will be given about how to make any changes. Even if you are registered, please check with your family and friends and remind them to make sure they are properly registered. Don't forget, only people who are registered can vote.

General Information

Development on Bromley Road, at the bottom of Crantock Road - information.

The building that is currently being constructed is part of a planning permission granted in 2008 (DC/07/67513) for the construction of a part four/part five storey building to provide a self-storage facility (Use Class B8) and offices (Use Class B1) on the site of 160 Bromley Road SE6, together with the construction of 7 commercial (Use Class B1) single storey plus mezzanine units, associated landscaping, provision of a service yard, relocation of electricity sub-station, 68 cycle spaces and 35 car parking spaces.

Information relating to the granted scheme can be found online using the application reference DC/07/67513. The building was granted permission in 2008.

There has been an advertising application recently for the site which was consulted on in November last year. This was determined on the 22 of January. The reference for this is DC/14/89648 and again, details can be viewed online.

20 Miles an Hour - Lewisham Wide. Information to take away

20 mph zones have been introduced in residential areas throughout Lewisham over the last 12 years as part of the borough's traffic safety schemes. As a result 65% of the borough's roads are now 20 mph roads. To create a consistent and fair road network for all borough road users the Labour manifesto for the 2014 mayoral and local elections - 'Lewisham Together, towards a better future' plans to build on the success of the 20mph zones by introducing a borough 20 mph speed limit.

The proposed approach and programme of work

Data collection will take place to benchmark and establish current speeds. As the speed limits signs are implemented on going monitoring of speeds and compliance will take place. Where we identify locations that require action to slow down traffic speeds the publicity will be enhanced in the location. If this does not improve situations then physical measures may be considered.

A step by step approach will be used throughout the programme delivery ;-

- Data collection of speeds/ analysis of data (six months from Jan 15 June 15).
- Consultation with key stakeholders such as the emergency services, TfL, and neighbouring authorities - Police are likely to object to the borough wide implementation initially as some roads may not be suitable without traffic calming to ensure self-enforcing compliance. We will work closely with the Met Police to work out issues and resolve them so we can deliver a joined up approach and a successful implementation process throughout the scheme. (Jan 15 - Sept 15).
- Review policy relating to the design of 20mph areas and the programme of work for the introduction of the limit. (Sep 15 Mar 16)
- Complete the required programme of work for Traffic orders and implementation (April 16 July 16). This assumes minimal work on the ground at this stage.
- Design options (interventions) to encourage\enforce compliance (May 17 Oct 17)
- Arrange formal consultation on compliance measures with emergency services and buses (Sept 17 - Dec 2017).
- Carry out a widespread publicity and public information campaign as part of LB Lewisham's new Road Safety Plan Jan 2015 to March 2018

Consultation and Publicity

A programme of publicity and advertising materials will be available to support the implementation of the speed limit. Information will be available on social media, Lewisham website and to schools and businesses to ensure that there is a great awareness of the speed limit for residents, local businesses. Information on the introduction of the speed limit and on media such as bus backs and petrol stations on the main routes will also be available for those travelling through the borough.


