1 Summary

- 1.1 On Wednesday 11th October 2017, Laurelle Henry was elected the Fourteenth Young Mayor of Lewisham. Edafese Erhenede was elected Deputy Young Mayor. The Young Mayor and Advisors worked throughout that year to develop and then consult on a range of ideas that now form the Young Mayor's Budget proposals for 2017/18.
- 1.2 These proposals are intended to provide improvements in services for children and young people in the borough. The Young Mayor for 2017/18 has a budget of £25,000 to be allocated after consultation with young people.
- 1.3 This report will do two things; summarise the achievements of the budget from the Young Mayor, Kayla Sh'ay in 2016/17 and outline the work programme of the Young Mayor, Laurelle Henry and Young Advisors in 2017/18 and the budget proposals from that term of office.
- 1.4 This report summarises the proposals which the 2017/18 Young Mayor is recommending to spend £25,000.

2 Recommendation

- 2.1 That the Mayor agrees the Young Mayor's budget proposals at section 8.

3 Policy Context

- 3.1 The Young Mayor Programme is a key priority for the Council in delivering on its commitment to giving children and young people the best start in life and building an inclusive local economy.

- 3.2 The work of the Young Mayor and Young Advisors makes a particular contribution to many of the outcomes set out in the Children and Young People's Plan.
- 3.3 The Young Mayor Programme makes an important contribution to the objectives and priorities identified in the new Corporate Strategy 2018-2022 which sets out 7 corporate priorities that drive decision making in the Council. The Young Mayor Programme specifically supports the priority "Giving children and young people the best start in life and seeks to ensure that "every child has access to an outstanding and inspiring education and is given the support they need to keep them safe, well and able to achieve their full potential".

4 Background

- 4.1 The Young Mayor Programme has been in place since April 2004. Laurelle Henry is the Fourteenth Young Mayor. Laurelle won the election on a turnout of 54.64% which represents 9334 young people voting.
- 4.2 An evaluation of the project continues to be undertaken by Dr Kalbir Shukra from Goldsmith's College, University of London with further exit polls at the election and interviews with candidates.

5 Budget Expenditure and Achievements, 2016/17 Young Mayor Kayla Sh'ay

- 5.1 Following consultation with young people across the borough, the Young Mayor and Young Advisors identified two areas of work.
- 5.2 Budget Expenditure 2016/17 Young Mayor Kayla Sh'ay
 - 5.2.1 The Young Mayor and Advisors identified as a priority for the budget, two areas in order to address the needs and interests which had arisen over the year, and from the consultation process, to complement existing provision and also to recognise the continuing and increasing strain on public resources.
- 5.3 Area 1: Curriculum for Life
 - 5.3.1 To work with others across the borough to develop a curriculum for life, identifying what young people want to learn which is currently outside the mainstream curriculum. This includes things like first aid, mental health and wellbeing, debating and discussion about ethical, social and world issues to help form opinions and build confidence and self-esteem. It also includes practical issues such as knowing about rights in employment, taxation and pensions, an extension of preparing young people for life after/outside school.
- 5.4 A group of young people on work experience as well as the young advisors visited schools and youth clubs to research and draw up recommendations for the subjects and issues to be covered. A

considerable amount of work and ideas have been contributed from different groups of young people in the borough.

5.5 A small group of colleagues in Lewisham have been meeting to try and move these ideas forward. They are due to be presented by young people to strategic bodies such as the Head teachers briefing, governors and Secondary Challenge to see where these ideas can be fitted into policy development and school plans, taking into account the pressures that schools are already experiencing.

5.6 The budget has not been allocated yet but will be used to pay for activities and sessions which will be piloted in some schools, suggestions include activities such as first aid workshops.

Total: £10,000.00

5.7 Area 2: Curriculum for Enterprise

5.7.1 The Curriculum for Enterprise is part of and will complement the Curriculum for Life to offer opportunities for young people to learn about and experience being involved in enterprise culture as a response to changing work places. Working with existing opportunities in Lewisham and feeding into bodies such as the Business Support Providers Forum, Education Business Partnership and youth organisations like Young Enterprise to strengthen the pathways for young people in to this field.

5.7.2 This part of the budget will be implemented alongside the Curriculum for Life, and be a pot for schools to apply to for support and an enterprise project, an identified youth space for enterprise support.

Total: £15,000.00

6 Activities during 2017/18 by Young Mayor Laurelle Henry and the Young Advisors Group

6.1 Since October 2017, the Young Mayor and Advisors have continued to represent their peers at the local, regional, national and international level. Working collaboratively with the Mayor and Cabinet, Scrutiny Committees, councillors, Council officers, partner agencies and other key stakeholders, the Young Mayor and Advisors have made an important contribution to local policy development over the course of the last year. They have also continued to support projects that relate to and address issues which concern young people.

6.2 All these examples of work and activities have been carried out by the Young Mayor and Young Advisors Team over the year;

6.3 Over the last year, the Young Mayor and Advisors have also worked extremely effectively with colleagues and services across the Council.

Increasingly, this way of working has extended to other local agencies within the wider partnership structure. In order to both sustain the proposals of the previous Young Mayor, and to develop their own, these networks and relationships are proving crucial.

7 The Young Mayor's Budget Proposals 2017/18

7.1 Consultation

7.1.1 The Young Mayor has worked closely with both her Advisors and with schools and youth organisations in identifying how to best spend the allocated budget, as well as consulting more widely through social media. There has also been dialogue with local groups in the voluntary and community sector.

7.1.2 Initial ideas for spending proposals were gathered from a range of sources and forums, including from candidates manifestos and the election campaign. These were then discussed at the Young Advisors meetings and the long-list put into a postcard format. The Young Advisors designed a tick box postcard to make it easier when talking to others and gathering views, it also had a space to write more where if required.

7.1.3 This long-list was taken to schools and youth projects and used at events, where a wider group of local young people were able to debate and discuss about the merits of the emerging proposals.

7.1.4 This is the long list as it went out to schools, colleges, youth clubs and the voluntary sector for consultation:

- Arts, sports and performance opportunities
- Employment and enterprise opportunities
- Healthy Living and lifestyles
- Work with faith groups, intergenerational and diversity projects
- Environment issues, clean streets, traffic and transport
- Being safe, working together to help everyone feel and be safe
- School; what we learn and why, linking school to working life, support in school.
- informal education, youth services

7.2.9 The Young Mayor and Young Advisors will continue to work with partners in both the authority and partners to promote opportunities and develop ideas to address these interests. As seen through the areas of work detailed in section 6 the Young Mayor and Advisors group aim to work through a wide range of issues, concerns and interests which are raised by young people over the year. The consultation results came back to the Young Mayor and Young Advisors and the following proposals were developed.

8 Budget Proposals 2017/18 Young Mayor Laurelle Henry

- 8.1 The Young Mayor and Advisors have identified as a priority for this year's budget three areas in order to address the needs and interests which have arisen over the year, and from the consultation process, to complement existing provision and also to recognise the continuing and increasing strain on public resources.
- 8.2 The proposals are intended to be very specific, linked to outcomes that are achievable and deliverable. The Curriculum for Life is an ongoing piece of work initiated in last year's budget. With further consultation and ideas from different groups of young people and from some colleagues this has taken additional time to achieve. The contribution from this budget further consolidates young peoples and increasingly other professionals' interest and support for this piece of work. It will enable further resources and evaluation of this project.
- 8.3 Proposal 1
Continuing the development of the Curriculum for Life;
- Small pot grants for schools and other organisations to apply to initiate/continue /develop/expand a project addressing any of the areas and issues identified in the Curriculum for Life

£10,000.00

- Schools Conference event in in Summer term 2019 to share the best practice of projects/session funded by the small pot and/or other activities which fit into the Curriculum for Life – Identify ways forward developing a young person led self-evaluation of the Curriculum for Life

£3,000.00

- Develop a Lewisham Alumni Programme – Past students from Lewisham schools will meet together and develop ideas about how they can contribute to supporting current students through sharing their experience and stories and through taking part in classes which relate to their jobs /careers/ experiences. To influence and raise aspirations of students thinking about who they want to be and what they want to do and showing how to collaborate and continue to work as part of the community. Pilot in two schools.

8.4 Proposal 2: First Aid

To contribute to the ongoing interest and concern that Young people have to access First Aid training to enable them to be better prepared to help others. Working with Street Doctors providing First Aid sessions taking place in schools and youth services.

8.5 Proposal 3: Enterprise and showcase

An event combining entrepreneurial and other opportunities for young people alongside a talent showcase and access to education and employment support in the creative sector

8.7 Progress and Evaluation

- 8.7.1 The new Young Mayor and Young Advisors will report progress in implementing these proposals to Youth forums, School Councils, Mayor and Cabinet and the B-involved website and other social media.
- 8.7.2 An ongoing consultation and evaluation process will take place with local young people through the Youth Service, School Councils, the Voluntary and Community Sector and People’s Day, as well as the B-

9 Financial Implications

- 9.1 The net costs of the proposed programme is £25k and will be met from the budget for the Young Mayor's programme.

10 Legal Implications

- 10.1 Section 2 of the Local Government Act 2000 empowers the local authority to do anything which it considers likely to achieve the promotion or improvement of the economic, social or environmental well-being of all or any persons within the local authority's area. It enables the Council to incur expenditure under these wellbeing powers which could include a budget for the Young Mayor. The sum of £25,000 is a reasonable for the purposes outlined in the report.

11 Crime and Disorder Implications

- 11.1 The Young Mayor's proposals relate to the development of activities, resources and information that will provide young people with diversionary activities, contribute to community initiatives and provide opportunities for young people to address issues concerned with their safety.

12 Equality Implications

- 12.1 The Young Mayor and Young Advisors have considered the equalities implications in all of the proposals and will ensure an inclusive approach to all activities undertaken. For example working with the special schools and groups such as Looked after Children and Young Carers who might find it more difficult to participate.

13 Environmental Implications

- 13.1 There are no environmental implications arising from this report.
